

THE SPORT REVIEW FORT HILL EXPLOSION

FRONTENACS DEFEATED PETER-
BORO BY 10 TO 4

Queen's Hockey Team To Practice
This Evening — Electrical Score

The junior Frontenacs opened a suc-

landing four more points as com-

terboro bunch.

result of their excellent play last

the nets for Queen's senior outfit

played an excellent game. On one

FIRST FIRES OF THE YEAR

The Brigade Had Three Calls in
Thirteen Hours.

The first fire of the year occurred
on Tuesday afternoon, when the bri-
gade was called to the residence of
Dr. C. Nash, Albert street, where a
spark from a defective fire grate caused
\$30 damage.

At 7:04 p.m. there was a call to
extinguish a blaze in a chimney at
423 King street east. No damage
resulted.

At 2:50 a.m. Wednesday, the bri-
gade was summoned by telephone to
the Y.W.C.A. building, 196 Johnson
street, where the kitchen was filled
with smoke. The hose wagon and
the men of No. 2 station responded,
but found that the commotion was
caused by a pot of meat being left
on the stove and burning till it
began to smoulder. There was no
damage, Chief Armstrong reports, ex-
cept to the meat.

WHO'LL BE CHAIRMEN

Of the City Council Committees
This Year?

Aldermen are figuring as to who
among them will be chosen as chair-
men of civic committees. For Board
of Works Aid, J. W. Litton, the de-
feated mayoralty candidate, is one
suggested. As Ald. Kent is looked

parks committee the only other two
committees at the disposal of council
are property and fire, and light,
which, it is contended, should be

A GREAT BLAST WAS SET OFF WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON

To Make a Roadway Through the
Hill — Twenty-two Hundred
Pounds of Explosives Were Use-
ed.

For the past few days, much interest
has been taken in the gigantic
blast which was set off on Wednesday
afternoon, where they are blasting a
roadway through Barriehill hill. The
firm which undertook the blasting is
the Olympic Powder company, of Des-
cento, and the superintendent, W. S.
Pearce, came here to supervise the
job. He was assisted by John Mc-
Kenny, of the same firm.

The chamber which contained the ex-
plosives was drilled in the rock eight
feet square, and four feet high at
the end of a thirty-five-foot passage
way drilled into the heart of the hill,
at an angle of forty-five degrees. This
large chamber, which widened out into
a T shape, was filled with 1,200
pounds of stick powder, and 1,000
pounds of granular powder, making a
total of 2,200 pounds of powerful ex-
plosives. This charge was connected
with an electric wire which led to an
electric battery between a quarter and
a half a mile down the Barriehill
road.

Alexander McIntosh, the foreman in
charge of the blast, which is known
as a cogotte, pressed the button
which exploded the charge. It was
figured that the blast would either
raise or blow out 4,300 tons of rock.

THE WEEK OF PRAYER.

Address in Chalmers Church on
Tuesday Evening.

The second evening in connection
with the week of prayer was held
in Chalmers church on Tuesday eve-
ning. Rev. Alfred Brown spoke
on, "The Individual and the
Church." He said it was the duty
of all to stand united in one con-
quering body. A church which
ceases in its powers of usefulness,
to help those who are needy, or if
one member suffer, and his co-part-
ners do not suffer with him then it
will be pretty nearly time for that
church to have an awakening. Only
by the usefulness which the church
has displayed, has it succeeded in
all nations, and widened its scope.
The motto of the churches of to-
day is "to conquer." If any church
wavers in this, or barely flickers, it
will not be long before a tottering
will result. A church of this kind
may be classed as cold, and the
teachers within it, likewise, or pos-
sibly it may have no teachers at all.

As Mr. Brown said it is not mere-
ly for church followers to
stay within the benches and let
danger threaten them, but instead of
remaining at one particular stand-
point must advance their trenches,
and be continually in the advance
line, ready to move on again and

ing us. The church will always
