INJURY PROVES FATAL

DEATH OF W. J. MULLFORD, OF GANANOQUE.

Fell On the Ice Last Friday Striking on his Head—Ejection of Officers by Oddfellows.

Gananoque, Jan. 8.—William J. Mullford, son of Henry Mullford, of this town, passed away suddenly, on Tuesday, in the 20th year of his age. On Friday last the young man was out on the ice and fell striking the back of his head. No special attention was paid to his injury at the time, but on Sunday night he complained of severe pain in his head. Medical aid was brought in, and everything done that could be, but he gradually grew worse and succumbed to the effect of his injuries on Tuesday. The funeral took place this afternoon from the home of his sister, Mrs. Gordon Warren, to Grace church, where Rev. Melvin Taylor conducted the funeral service, after which the remains were laid to rest in Gananoque vault.

SUNBURY CASE HEARD.

Man Drunk at Concert Fined \$20 and Costs.

On Thursday morning seven young men living in the vicinity of Sunbury appeared before Justice of Peace George Hunter and J. W. Bradshaw to answer to the charge of being under the influence of liquor in a local opinion township. After hearing the evidence of a number of witnesses, the charges against the six were dismissed. The seventh acknowledged his guilt and was fined \$20 and costs. It appears that at recent Christmas tree entertainments, held in Sunbury, on the evening of December 22nd, there was a disturbance. Although several witnesses swore that the noise had evidently been caused by these young men, none would swear that the others were under the influence of liquor. Rev. Dr. Sheridan, minister of the Sunbury Methodist church, would not swear that the accused were intoxicated.

DEPUTY MINISTER OF MINES

Prof. Reginald W. Brock Succeeds Dr. A. P. Low.

Ottawa, Jan. 8.—Prof. Reginald W. Brock, director of the geological survey of Canada, has been appointed deputy minister of mines in succession to Dr. A. P. Low, who has retired.

Prof. Brock was born in Perth in 1874, educated at the Ottawa Collegiate Institute and Toronto, Queen's and Heidelberg Universities. He was a professor at Queen's School of Mines before joining the staff of the geological survey. In the position he has carried out many important explorations, and is regarded as the best geological authority in Canada. Since 1904 he has been director of the survey, and has filled that position with marked acceptance and ability.

ANOTHER CONFESSION

FROM A MEMBER OF THE PENITENTIARY STAFF.

Name of Guilty Party Is Being Withheld by the Commission—Matter to be Taken Up With the Minister of Justice.

Although the members of the commission did not make the matter public, it is understood that a second member of the penitentiary staff has admitted that he violated a rule of the penitentiary, in having secured money for a convict, making a "strike off" for himself.

The chairman of the commission had nothing to say about the matter when interviewed by the Whig, further than that the trafficking in tobacco was still under investigation. The warden is making an investigation, and it is not likely that any more of the guards will be brought before the commission.

It is quite evident that the commission intends to carry on the remainder of the investigation so far as the guards and the trafficking of tobacco is concerned in a very quiet manner.

Will the guards who have been found guilty dismissed? This is the question which is being asked. As far as could be learned on Thursday there has as yet been no dismissal.
