### BOARD OF EDUCATION

ELECTED W. H. MACNEE AS CHAIRMAN FOR 1914.

Committees Elected New Members Sworn in By Mayor Shaw — An Election Asked For in Sydenham Ward.

By a unanimous vote the Board of Education, at its inaugural meeting on Wednesday night, elected Trustee W. H. Macnee as chairman. The board appointed the various committees and put through a list of business in record time.

Mayor Shaw was present and at the opening of the meeting the newly elected members were sworn in by his worship, who also delivered a short address. He referred to the fact that it was just eighteen years ago since he had retired from the Board of Education. At this time there were fourteen members but negotiations were on foot to have the Collegiate Institute represented. He had very pleasant memories of the time he had spent on the board. He realized that the question of education was a most important one. It had to do with the making of citizenship. When the speaker was on the board there was a good staff of teachers, and since that time the board had held to the same rule. The teachers had a most important part to play in the moulding of the character of scholars. Mayor Shaw said that no doubt the time would come when more men would rule in the schools.

In his closing remarks his worship stated that he regarded the present board "equal to any." He was pleased at the appointments made to the board by the City Council, and in a jocular way remarked that he had only one fault to find with the men selected, and that fact could not be remedied. He had reference to the fact that they attended the same church. The members referred to are Trustees Farrell, Renton and Prof. Alexander Laird, who are members of Chalmers church.

Trustee Renton said that every member of the board was delighted to have Mayor Shaw present. He was an ex-member of the board and the records showed that he had always stood for the very best for the pupils. Trustee Renton then moved a vote of thanks to Mayor Shaw. Trustee Meek seconded the motion and it was carried by a unanimous vote.

Taking the chair, the newly-elected chairman returned his thanks for the honor conferred upon him. Since he had been a member of the board he had always been pleased to attend all the meetings. He had served as chairman of the property committee, and had also served on the management committee. In accepting the position he realized that it was a most responsible one. Able men had presided at the board before him, and he would conduct the proceedings of the board to the best of his ability, and for the best interests of the citizens as a whole.

The chairman then called upon Prof. Laird to offer prayer, and afterwards the striking committee appointed to select the standing committees retired and brought in a report, which was submitted by Trustee Meek, and adopted.

### Committees Appointed

The following committees were appointed, the first named in each to be chairman:

Management—Messrs. Meek, Craig, Mills, Elliott, Sawyer.

Property—Messrs. Chown, Pirkett, Chapman, Monk, (and trustee to be elected in Sydenham ward).

Finance—Messrs. Bell, Anglin, Farrell, Mills, McLean.

Industrial advisory—Messrs. Renton, Lemmon, Macnee, Metcalfe, Chapman, separate school representative, Hugh Douglass and A. L. Woods, for three years; W. Wormwith and George Mowat, for two years; T. Lambert and Gustave Cairn, one year.

Commercial advisory—Trustees Elliott, Laird, Waugh, separate school representative, N. C. Polson, jr., W. H. Craig, for two years; D. G. Laird and W. Mitchell, for one year.

The following school chairman were elected: Collegiate Institute, Trustee Metcalfe; Central school, Trustee Anglin; Victoria school, Trustee Craig; Macdonald school, Trustee Chapman; Frontenac school, Trustee Monk; Louise school, Trustee Laird; Cataract school, Dr. Waugh; Sydenham school, new trustee to be elected; Kildare school, Trustee Mills; Depot school, Trustee Bell; Orphans' Home, Trustee Sawyer.

The chairman congratulated the board on the selection of chairmen for the various committees, stating that they were all able men, and he felt sure that the work would be done in their hands.

The roll was then called and the following responded: Chairman Macnee, Trustees A. W. McLean, F. R. Anglin, Dr. G. W. Bell, P. B. Chown, W. J. Chapman, James Craig, J. G. Elliott, J. M.
