THE HOCKEY REVIEW

FRONTENACS ARE GRATEFUL TO REGIOPOLIS COLLEGE.

For Allowing Norman Millan and W. Cook to Play With Team — The Hockey Excursion to Toronto Next Tuesday.

One of the Frontenac executive, in speaking about the splendid showing the juniors have made so far this year, said: "It is our desire that full appreciation be given in a public way to the unselfishness and fine sportsmanlike actions of the authorities at Regiopolis College in allowing William Cook and Norman Millan to join forces with Frontenacs in an endeavor to bring a championship to Kingston. Such public-spirited action is appreciated by citizens of Kingston. Principal Quinn has always come forward in a pinch to help out the Frontenacs and we desire to state our appreciation of his kindness. If this same spirit of 'pulling together' was manifested by everybody each season, we would make the name of Kingston a household word throughout Canada in connection with hockey."

FRONTENACS VS. OSGOODE AGAIN

The Frontenac Hockey Club's excursion to Toronto by special G.T.H. train, on Tuesday next, promises to be one of the best excursions held in recent years. At this time of the year, Toronto's theatrical and social season is at its height, so that those going on the trip will have every opportunity of enjoying an enjoyable visit to the Queen City. The Arena Gardens, where Frontenacs play Osgoode on Tuesday night, is the most beautiful artificial rink in Canada, having been erected last year at a cost of over \$350,000. It is lighted by over 1,000 lights. Being arena-shaped, a perfect view of the games can be had from every seat. On Wednesday night the two Toronto professional teams, Toronto and Ontario, play a regular league game. Allan Davidson, who is playing such a star game for the Toronto team, will be seen in line with his team. Bert Hunt is out with the Ontario team and the contest should be a great one to watch.

HOCKEY NOTES.

McGill will play Harvard in Boston on January 31st. The Ottawa hockey club is again angling for a good forward. This is the twelfth season of a Canadian intercollegiate hockey. In that period Toronto and Queen's have each won the championship four times. McGill has come out ahead three years. Referee Lawson Whitehead of Toronto, says that Whitty's new rink is now the finest rink in Kingston, in Ontario east of Toronto. The ice surface is 200 by 75 feet. Toronto Globe: There are some saucy little junior teams in the O.H.A. this season. Orillia have shown their usual class as champions. The Woodstock runners-up are strong again, and Belleville, Kingston, Toronto Canoe Club, University of Toronto and Ingersoll, all appear formidable. Vic. Gilbert who played goal for Argos against Toronto Rowing Club, &A.A., had somehow or other he slipped through the hands of Manager Livingston. With Gilbert in goal the champions would have about the best senior defence in the O.H.A. Toronto Ontario will ask to have the last Ottawa game replayed on the ground that there is a rule in the constitution of the N.H.A. which makes it compulsory for the home club to have the bars of the nets attached to the ice in such a way as to make it impossible to slide the puck in from the sides or the back.

THE BANK OF TORONTO

Annual Report Discloses a Successful Year.

The fifty-eighth report, just issued, of a bank, first opened in 1856, shows a long and successful career. The net profits for the year, after making the usual deductions for salaries and bad and doubtful debts, were \$350,694, a little over 17 per cent. on the capital. To this is added \$176,378, balance from previous year, and \$200,000 from former appropriations not required, making a total amount for distribution of \$1,227,272. The dividends at 11 per cent. and bonus of 1 per cent. to shareholders, called for \$600,000. The usual appropriation to officers' pension fund of \$30,000 was again made. There was written off 10 per cent. of the total amount, and making \$500,000 written off in past three years. The amount carried forward in profit and loss, \$307,272, which with the rest of \$6,000,000, made total reserve funds exceed the paid-up capital of \$5,000,000 by \$1,307,272. The deposits of the Bank of Toronto show an increase of \$1,651,250, a satisfactory showing in view of the vast withdrawals of deposits throughout the country for other investments. The assets immediately available, \$14,072,236, are equal to 28.36 per cent. of liabilities to the public, and an increase for the year of \$1,833,018. Loans for the year amounted to \$43,477,835. After allowing for the different methods of treating the rebate of interest called for by the new act, a net decrease of \$1,068,017 is shown, indicating the ability of the bank to strengthen its position by turning part of its loans into available funds while at the same time taking care of the needs of its many customers at points scattered from Gaspe to Victoria. It is noticeable that the statement does not include any "loans elsewhere."

The total assets are \$60,925,164—an increase for the year of \$1,698,616. The statement is certified by an outside auditor, thus complying with the regulations of the new bank act although the provisions of the act do not apply until after the annual meeting just held.

The local branch, in charge of Geo. B. McKay, has participated in the genuine progress and success of this enterprising banking institution.
