To-night the Little Damozel
At the Grand Opera House to-night Lawrence Brough is appearing in this delightful comedy, "The Little Damozel," a delightful comedy of English life dealing with two very distinct types of society. The Late Capt. Griffith
At Sillaville, on December 27th, one of the most widely known and highly respected residents passed away in the person of Capt. David E. Griffith. Capt. Griffith was a Methodist in religion. In politics a conservative. He leaves to mourn his loss one sister, Mrs. E. H. Dunbar, and one brother, John on the old homestead.
