

A. B. Farmer, of Toronto, lectured before the political science club of Queen's university on Friday afternoon on "Single Tax." By argument and illustration, Mr


Mr. Farmer dwelt at some length in support of the argument of the singletaxers. Upon the value of land which is created by the growth of the munity, (thus the property of community as a whole), he held, tax should be levied to meet educational requirements, police and fire pro-tection, and the needs of public utili-

One of the benefits of the single tax which Mr. Farmer mentioned was that it would be impossible for men to any community. The tax on the land alone, if it could be done, he declared Mr. Farmer advanced ways by which to get at the correct value of land practicable. It is far easier, said he to get at the correct value of lanh than anything else. Even now the aw gives assessors certain powers which he intimated were not always exercised to a very large extent. Some of the factors to be considered in the valuation of land which he enumerated, were its size, the problem of the
