originated from the kitchen stove. The house was a one and one-balf storey frame structure and nearly new and the children, it is understood, were sleeping upstairs.

There are houses about a hundred feet away on either side, and neighbors were awakened about two o'clock by screams and the crackling Head of Orange Order Likely to go of flames. They reached the burning house just in time to take care of the distracted woman, but so far had the fire progressed that the building coltapsed before any attempt could be made to reach the children.


