BOTH FRONTENAC TEAMS TO PLAY THIS WEEK

Peterboro Juniors Will Be Here on Friday — Montreal Comments on Queen's Hockey Team.

The senior Frontenacs will leave for Toronto, on Tuesday noon by special train, and meet Osgoode's on Tuesday evening in the return game of the senior O. H. A. group. It is expected that a large number will accompany the team, on account of the excursion rate. The team will line up as follows: Goal, Cook; defence, Ferguson and Stanton; rover, Brown; centre, Crawford; wings, Boyer and Reid.

Frontenac Juniors vs Peterboro
The junior Frontenacs will play the return game with Peterboro at the covered rink on Friday evening. A win for the juniors will put the team in good running for the championship of the group. It is likely that the Frontenacs and Belleville will be matched to play off for the championship of the two eastern groups.

Pictou vs. K. C. I.
The Kingston Collegiate hockey squad will clash with Pictou, at the covered rink, on Wednesday evening, in the junior O.H.A. series.

Ontario Athletic Club

Box and Dobson Starred
Montreal Gazette: Two men who figured largely in the Queen's victory, were Box and Dobson. For the locals, Ramsay-Rankin, the veteran defence player, was in brilliant form and had it not been for him, McGill might have been hopelessly outclassed. The Montreal telegraph: Queen's outplayed McGill in the opening battle for the Intercollegiate Hockey League title, getting away with a 5 to 4 victory. The visiting combination showed better team play than the winners of the red and white, their five goals all being scored on nice combination play. The locals appeared to rely upon their individual efforts to carry them on to victory, but the Queen's men followed back too closely, with the result that the rushes of the local players were broken up before any serious damage had been done.

Montreal Star: Brilliant play on the part of Queen's marked the hockey victory of Queen's University over McGill. The Kingston seven outplayed the local collegians at all times, the score of 5 to 4 by no means indicating the share of the play. Judging by the game they put up, Queen's stand a very good chance of carrying off the championship this year. The Presbyterians have a well-balanced team, composed of men who are fast skaters and good stick-handlers. They have three first-class men in W. Smith, Box and McKinnon. Their goalkeeper, R. Smith, promises to develop into the best goalkeeper of the league. Their other men are also better than the average, and the team as a whole plays a fine combination game.

St. Michael's hockey team defeated Varsity, in a senior O.H.A. game, in Toronto, on Saturday afternoon, by 9 goals to 4. Varsity is the team which defeated Frontenacs.

TO RELIEVE DISTRESS

UTILITIES COMMISSION ASKED TO PROVIDE WORK

For the Unemployed in the City of Kingston — Poor Relief Association Deal with Over Twenty-five Cases Last Week.

The committee of the Kingston Poor Relief association, having personal knowledge of the distress at present existing in the city, on account of the scarcity of work, and consequent lack of the necessities of life, would respectfully suggest to the commission on civic interests, the need for providing some kind of useful employment which should enable the men now unemployed to earn a living wage instead of receiving a charitable dole, and would also direct the attention of the commission to the high rents too often charged for poor and unsanitary dwellings in order to ascertain whether some check cannot be placed on this evil.

The above resolution was passed at a meeting of the Kingston Poor Relief Association, held on Saturday, and as a result Rev. A. F. Smart, acting for the Associated Charities, was appointed to wait on the Utilities Commission at its meeting on Monday afternoon, to place the matter before that body. The association is anxious to have all the assistance possible given the unemployed.

During last week the Poor Relief association had over twenty-five cases to deal with.
