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
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
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

Classes Will be Established in Shop Arithmetic, Mechanical Drawing, Millinery and Dressmaking as Starter.

Industrial classes will be menced in Kingston during the first week in February. A splendid dpportunity will now be afforded those who are desirous of being taught along certain lines.

The Board of Education rooms will be open next Friday night, when Principal Sliter, of the Collegiate Institute with the secretary of the board will be present to give all the information desired about the classes.
