**COLLEGIATES DOUBLED**

**THE SCORE ON PICTON JUNIOR HOCKEY TEAM**

The O. H. A. Fixture Resulted 10 to 6 - At Half Time Picton Led by 6 to 5.

After being behind one goal at half time the Kingston Collegiate hockey squad put on full steam in the last half and trimmed Picton by a score of sixteen to eight, at the covered rink, on Wednesday evening, in the junior O.H.A. fixture.

The first half was only a fair exhibition of hockey. During this period the referee had occasion to bench a number of players.

When play was resumed after the first period Coach Kelly's boys opened on the Picton nets, which resulted in eleven goals, compared to two scored by the visiting team. At half time Picton was leading by six to five. During the last period the local boys showed superior condition. Although leading there was no let up for K.C.I. players.

The game was about fifteen minutes late in starting on account of the train from the west which brought the Picton team here being late.

Both teams seemed to be very evenly matched during the first half. "Jimmie" Stewart got away on four occasions and netted the puck. C. Toland made the other point during the period.

With the score standing six to five the K.C.I. boys opened on the Picton nets immediately after the play had been resumed in the second half.

The fast play told on the Picton defence. Harry Cooke broke through five times. "Jimmie" Stewart added four more points, while H. Toland and Ferguson were each credited with one.

The winners played a fine game. Singleton on the defence appeared to be rather weak during the first thirty minutes. He has been ill for the past week.

All members of the Picton team played a very good game. Cooper and Ringer were the most noticeable in the forward line. The teams were:

**Question of Having Firemen Respond To Call From R. M. C.**

At the last meeting of the Fire and Light committee, the question of having the fire department respond to a call from the Royal Military College, was under discussion, and a committee was appointed to look into the matter. It is likely that the committee will report at the next meeting.

It is stated that the college is fairly well equipped for a small fire, but the authorities are very anxious to have some arrangements made, whereby the city firemen, if called upon, would be in a position to respond without any delay.

At the present time there is one great drawback in the scheme, in that it would be dangerous to take the fire apparatus over the temporary bridge. It is stated that there would be danger of a breakdown.

It is likely that some arrangement will be made that will work out satisfactorily.

**Civic Rinks Will Provide Great Fun For Them**

Kingston's "kiddies" are happy. The announcement that the city would provide three open air free rinks for them was received by every youngster with three cheers and a "tiger."

Chairman Harrison, of the Property committee, has made a start to have the rinks placed in shape for the children and the latter are enthusiastically waiting to give the rinks a test.

"It is one of the best plans ever put forth by this committee," one citizen was heard to remark yesterday, and this appears to be the opinion of citizens in general. Everybody is hoping that the rinks for the "kiddies" will be a great success.

**Technical Training**

Dr. Robertson, who was chairman of the Royal Commission on Industrial Training and Technical Education, until its enquiry and report were completed, has accepted some of the invitations from Boards of Trade and Canadian Clubs in Ontario, to address them on questions of local development through vocational education.

The dates so far arranged are: Kingston, 25th January; Peterboro, 29th January; Orillia, 30th January; Hamilton, 2nd February; and Guelph, 3rd February.

Dr. Robertson's intention is to outline the nature of the recent world-wide movement for the training of the productive, constructive and conserving workers of the great countries. Leaders in the eight countries visited by the commissioners, state that more progress has been made in them during the past ten years than during the previous fifty.

Many Canadians have been congratulating themselves on their great opportunities and highly creditable and correct pedagogic regulations which have been issued and maintained. Other countries have been doing things with the sweep of national ardor. Ontario has made a few good beginnings, and needs more money.

**Gananoque Cheese Meeting**

Gananoque, Jan. 20.—The patrons of the Gananoque cheese factory held their annual meeting Monday evening, Robert Cunningham acting as chairman. Short addresses were given by C. V. Ketchum, manager of the Bank of Toronto; John A. Webster, salesman, and J. H. Fawcett, proprietor. The statement for the past season was very gratifying. Milk received was 2,340,889 pounds; total cheese made, 209,054 pounds; amount paid to patrons, \$27,424.34. There was \$1,346.61 worth of butter made. The cheese-maker was given a raise of one-eighth of a cent a pound for the coming season.
