GAVE FIVE ADDRESSES VOICE OF THE PULPIT

IN SYDENHAM STREET METHODIST CHURCH, SUNDAY

Rev. Dr. Hazlewood, of Toronto, spoke on Questions Concerning Temperance and Moral Reform.

Rev. Dr. J. H. Hazlewood, of Toronto, one of the outstanding men of the ministry of Canadian Methodism, and of the field secretaries of the department of temperance and moral reform, spoke in Sydenham street church on Sunday. Dr. Hazlewood remarked in the morning that he becomes impatient with presumably good people who sing and talk about their home above, and support and attend the services and meetings of their respective church. But that is where they stop, they should, said he, be interested and engaged in cleaning up and improving conditions right here on earth. At the evening service he drew a comparison of the soldier on active service and the one who in time of peace follows the band down the street. Though not disparaging the man in uniform, the speaker declared that the great majority of church members are of the latter kind; they follow the band, again very often if the band does not play to suit them they refuse to follow it.

At Sydenham street church, Dr. Hazlewood, spoke five times, at both church services, the Bible school, and Wesleyan club in the afternoon, and at the "welcome" to students and strangers after the evening service.
