THE COUNTY COUNCIL WORK ON BREAKWATER

HELD ITS INAUGURAL SESSION ON TUESDAY AFTERNOON

John A. Kennedy, of Bedford, is the New Warden—The Standing Committees Appointed at the Wednesday Morning Session.

John A. Kennedy, reeve of the township of Bedford, is county warden for 1914. He was the unanimous choice of the Frontenac council when it met in its inaugural session on Tuesday afternoon at the court house. A caucus had been previously held, and Mr. Kennedy won out over J. A. Freeman, reeve of Portland.

When County Clerk Bradshaw called for nominations, Reeve Kennedy was the only name proposed, and on motion of Councillors Freeman and Hawkey he was duly elected. The clerk administered the declaration of office. The warden-elect thanked the council for the honor it had conferred upon him and announced that he would give something in the way of an inaugural address on Wednesday morning.

All the members of council were present at the meeting, viz.: J. Gray, Barrie; J. A. Kennedy, Bedford; F. Wensley, Clarendon and Miller; H. A. Calvin, Garden Island; John Foley, Howe Island; C. McKnight, Hinchinbrook; J. T. Hawkey and Benson Coulter, Kingston; Charles Truscott, Loughboro; Robert McVeigh, Oso; W. J. Franklin, Pittsburg; J. E. Freeman, Portland; James Halliday, Portemouth; W. J. Donaldson, Palmerton; and Canonio; C. W. Sleeth, Storrington; Dr. William Spankie, Wolfe Island; E. D. Park, Kennebec; A. Thompson, Olden.

On motion of Councillors Sleeth and Wensley, the following were appointed a committee to select the standing committees for the year: Councillors Donaldson, Thompson, Sleeth, Freeman, Wensley, Park and Truscott. The council then adjourned until Wednesday at 10 a.m.

Warden Kennedy has been reeve of Bedford for the past six years, and a county councillor for the same number of years. Before being elected reeve, he was a Bedford councillor for three years. He has stood only once in election for reeve, being chosen by acclamation since 1900. In religion, Mr. Kennedy is a Presbyterian. He is an Oddfellow and a member of the Masonic order.

At the Wednesday morning session these standing committees were appointed:

Property—Councillors Hawkey, (chairman), Sleeth, Freeman, Truscott, McKnight.

Roads and Bridges—Councillors Donaldson (chairman), Wensley, Franklin, Thompson, Parks.

Finance—Councillors Foley (chairman), Halliday, Calvin, Gray and Coulter.

Printing and Education—Councillors Freeman (chairman), McVeigh, Coulter, McKnight, Gray.

Quarterly Board of Audit—Councillor Spankie.

Good Roads—Councillors Truscott, (chairman), Freeman, Franklin, Hawkey, Sleeth.

Warden Kennedy thanked the council again for placing him at their head. For the benefit of the younger members of the council he remarked that when he entered the county service he was advised for the first year to keep his mouth shut. This was hard for him to do, of course. However, he would advise the new councillors to talk county matters at the board as much as they desired, but not to talk too much outside.

Among the communications read were the following:

Deputy minister of Education, stating that the department was favorable to the re-appointment of S. A. Truscott as school inspector for South Frontenac.

County Council of Huron, favoring the placing of harmless lunatics in houses of refuge of counties to which they belong.

County Registrar W. J. Gibson, asking for cabinet for preservation of county documents.

Toronto Hospital for Sick Children and Prisoners' Aid Association of Canada, asking for grants.

Glanville high school board presenting account of \$408.71 for fees of Frontenac pupils attending that school.

Ontario Educational association asking the council to appoint delegates to the convention in Toronto in April.

Sheriff Thomas Dawson drawing attention to the fact that the inspector of prisons and the district health officer have condemned the turnkey's quarters in the jail. The inspector's letter intimated that the council must provide new quarters for the turnkeys at once and in the meantime provide them with temporary quarters.

Thomas D. Minnes resigning as county auditor.

Magistrate Smith, of Sharbot Lake, asking that the county council pay him a salary.

Township of Oso council, petitioning for the re-establishment of a continuation school at Sharbot Lake.

On motion of Councillors Franklin and Truscott, the warden was appointed a member of all standing committees.

Notices of by-laws to be passed during the week were given by various councillors.

After hearing the report of school Inspector Truscott the council adjourned until 3 p.m. to allow the committees to convene.
