## TOWNSHIP NOT LIABLE

### FOR THE KEEP OF A FORMER RESIDENT.

#### Question of Responsibility For Maintaining an Inmate of the House for the Aged Discussed By the County Council.

At the Frontenac county council session on Wednesday afternoon, Councillor Wensley took objection to the charge made upon his township, Clarendon, of \$125.79 for the keep last year of A. Laraby, a former resident of that municipality. The Clarendon reeve stated that this old man, who was in the Home for the Aged, had not resided in that township for eleven years. He had left his wife and family and had not contributed anything to their keep. The family had also scattered. The

former reeve, J. D. Godkin, had signed a card for the admission of the unfortunate man to the city refuge, but he should not have done so. Councillor Wensley claimed that the case should be treated as a "float" and that the county as a whole should pay the bill. Councillor Donaldson agreed with the Clarendon reeve, stating that he knew all about the case and that it would be most unfair to charge that township with his keep. He moved that the county pay the bill for last year and be responsible in the future. Councillor Franklin moved in amendment that the matter be referred to the charities committee. The amendment carried. On motion of Councillors Foley and Wensley, Councillor Halliday was made a member of the property committee.

Report on Road Work

The Frontenac county council met for two hours on Thursday morning and adjourned until Friday morning in order to leave the afternoon open for committee meetings. When presenting his report on the work done during the year, the condition and requirements of the roads, R. H. Fair, the superintendent, urged the raising of money for this purpose by debentures. He stated: "You have noticed from this report that a large percentage of the roads and bridges will require large expenditures next year. This work on the county road system up to the present time has been done in pieces, and under the present system it would be many years before you will have any distance of continuous good roads. "I would, therefore, recommend that the money for road construction be raised by debenture, as the present yearly tax falls heavily on the ratepayers. Whereas, if money were available to build the roads throughout, the ratepayers would enjoy the benefits of good roads much sooner than otherwise." Some of the councillors and ratepayers, Mr. Fair realized, thought differently on this matter. But he did not think satisfaction would be attained until the money was raised by the debenture system. Quicker progress would be made. The engineer stated that the government inspector of good roads had remarked that Frontenac was the only county that had gone into good roads and not adopted the debenture system of financing. The financial summary of expenditures of the superintendent was: Roads, exclusive of bridges, \$22,803.14; bridges, \$2,167.51; road machinery, \$551.60; road superintendent's salary, \$880; rent for machinery, \$681; repairs before starting work in 1913, \$212.23; tools and small repairs, \$188.55; general expenses, \$59.34 total, \$27,454.62.

#### Other Business

Councillor Sleeth brought in the report on county roads and bridges. It provided for a grant of \$400 on Harrigan's bridge, township of Portland, said township to keep the bridge in repair for ten years. The report, which was adopted, also recommended that the county make a grant of \$100, to repair the Forest Lake bridge which the committee had examined. Councillors Sleeth and Truscott registered an objection to the name of Councillor McVeigh being added to the roads and bridges committee. They did not know where the process of addition would end. But the resolution was carried when put to a vote. Among the communications was one from the Salvation Army, asking that it be considered if the proposed jail chaplain is appointed. J. S. R. McCann applied for the county auditorship. The question of the proper christian name of a deceased warden of the county was introduced by Warden Kennedy. The portrait of the late Mr. Graham, of the township of Pittsburg, hangs in the council chamber. His christian name on the underline will be changed from "George" to "Peter." Councillor H. Calvin made an explanation regarding it. The deceased represented Pittsburg in council and later became warden. He was also an M. P. P.

## ST. ANDREW'S PROSPEROUS.

### Annual Meeting of the Congregation Held Wednesday Evening

"Notwithstanding the general conditions published in the press and the oration's declaration on the floor of parliament, insisting upon the stringency of the money market and the higher cost of living, our church has shown a most favorable result," reported John McIntyre, K.C., in the annual statement of the board of managers of St. Andrew's congregational meeting on Wednesday evening. This was certainly borne out by the reports of all the activities of the kirk.

The congregation assembled and filled the Sunday school hall. Rev. S. J. M. Compton, the minister, and Mr. McIntyre presided during the meeting. Mr. Compton, who has completed nearly two years in the charge, presented, as moderator, the annual report of the kirk session. This, with that of the board of managers, the Sunday school, the choir, and societies of the church, showed uniform advancement. There has been an increase in the giving for missions from \$1,141 in 1912 to \$2,469 in 1913.

The retiring managers, John McIntyre, K.C., F. C. Ireland, Prof. A. Macphail, M.P.P., and William Gill, were re-elected. Dr. Ferguson Carr-Harris, of Honan, China, who was designated last fall for the mission work was elected an elder of St. Andrew's in order that he may sit in presbytery in the foreign field. The minister and all officials and workers of the church were thanked. A resolution expressive of the congregation's appreciation of the work during the year of the choirmaster and choir was moved by Lt.-Col. H. R. Duff and seconded by Col. G. H. Ogilvie. Herbert Donnelly was thanked for his attention to the chimes. After the meeting refreshments were served.
