

MARTIN HARVEY COMING

Will Play "The Breed of the Treshams," Feb 6th

"The Breed of the Treshams," which will be given on Friday night, February 6th at the Grand under the auspices of the British Canadian Theatre Organization society, is a masterly example of a type of play which always makes a strong appeal to the British temperament. To begin with it is full to the brim of action, of that full-blooded adventurous quality which has distinguished the history of our race. The scene is laid in the stormy times when king and parliament were at war in England, probably the most picturesque and dramatic epoch in the national annals. The hero is one "Rebsey," dubbed "The Rat," a debonair, dandyish ragsabond to whom adventure and danger are the very salt of life. "Rebsey," as a type who has figured large in the making of the empire. A bold, resourceful man, brimful of humor and ready for every chance, and yet at bottom a man of indomitable will and, if you like of obstinacy. In the hands of Martin Harvey, "Rebsey, the Rat," stands out as one of the most vividly life-like and lovable creatures which the stage has ever given us. Another character-study of rare insight and attraction is that of the boy, "Batty," the self-appointed esquire of the whimsical knight-errant Rebsey. "Batty" is played by Miss N. de Silva, who first created the part, and who is quite inimitable in her grasp of its humors and possibilities. "The Breed of the Treshams," is essentially a play that can be seen more than once, a fact which some thousands of playgoers in the old country have proved in the most practical fashion. On Saturday afternoon and evening, Feb. 7th, Mr. Harvey will present, "The Only Way."

TO THE FIRST CONGREGATIONAL CHURCH PASTOR

The Church is Very Active - The Pastor Asks For Larger Giving to Objects Outside of the Church.

The annual meeting of the First Congregational church was held in the church parlors, Thursday evening. Tea was served from 6 to 7.30 o'clock to the members of the church and congregation, about one hundred sitting down to the tables.

After the supper, reports of the church work were given. These indicated a most prosperous year in the church's life. The treasurer's statement, presented by Dr. MacCallum, showed the total receipts to be approximately \$2,700. After meeting the expenses of the year a balance of \$112 was left in the treasury. The total giving showed an increase of \$150 over the previous year.

Miss Edith Massie gave a very full report of the work of the Sunday school and also of the woman's missionary auxiliary. Miss Lily Scott reported for the ladies aid and J. Lee for the young people's society.

The pastor's report showed that thirteen new members had been added to the church roll, four by letter and nine on profession of faith. There had been eleven baptisms during the year. The pastor urged a more liberal support of objects outside of the local church, especially of home missions. In concluding, he thanked the ladies for their New Year gift to Mrs. Rice, the choir for its faithful services throughout the year, and also Mrs. Robertson for the gift of flowers from Sunday to Sunday.

At the close of his report the pastor was asked to vacate the chair, whereupon he was presented with \$50 as an expression of esteem on the part of the church.

Mr. McIntosh brought greetings from Calvary church. During the evening solos were sung by Miss Myrtle King and Leonard Boswell. The meeting was brought to a close with the singing of the doxology.
