### AN UP-TO-DATE MAP

OF KINGSTON IS MUCH NEEDED AT THIS TIME.

A Real Estate Dealer Writes About Kingston's Building Progress—Council Should Boost Things.

Kingston, Jan. 28.—(To the Editor): We have now nicely entered on the year 1914 and a word as to its possibilities as regards the good old substantial city of Kingston will not come amiss. Taking it from the standpoint of the realty situation, we have nothing to complain of. The spring of 1913 showed the greatest activity in Kingston real estate that has occurred in many a year. As the summer came on business in all lines became quiet and a general depression became the order of things all over the dominion. Now how did Kingston compare with other cities in this respect? We find on looking over the building permits for 1913, as published in the Financial Post, issue of Jan. 24th, that out of fifty cities in Canada over one-half showed a decrease in comparison with 1912, but Kingston was not one of them. The figures as given in this table show building permits for this city as follows: 1912, \$645,747; 1913, \$666,474, an increase for last year of \$20,727, and this in what was considered by some as a panic year. The most significant fact of this increase is that for the month of December, 1912, the permits amounted to \$10,465, but in December, 1913, they were \$85,207. Going back over the last six years we find the building permits for Kingston as follows:—1908, \$370,600; 1909, \$452,095; 1910, \$220,092; 1911, \$314,569; 1912, \$645,747; 1913, \$666,474.

The value of building sites has steadily increased since last spring, and residential property has more than held its own, all in face of a general depression in all lines and the continual cry of the knockers that prices were too high and that the boom was over. Kingston has never had a boom, as the so-called boom of last spring was only a normal, healthy growth.

How many of the readers of this letter have invested their money in the west in the past few years and how many have you and I heard say that in the future Kingston would be good enough for them? A good many letters have appeared in the local press of late about the number of unemployed. We certainly must admit this to be the case, but what of the other cities in Canada? I venture to say that Kingston has stood the strain of hard times as well as any city in the dominion and a good deal better than most. Now what of the possibilities of this year 1914? The tiling plant has recently begun operations and is employing a number of hands, the extensive harbor improvements will be in full swing this year, and what a difference an up-to-date causeway, properly lighted, will present to the old wooden structure that has done duty for so many years!

This year will see the improvement of our principal street, both in lighting and paving, and not a minute too soon. I am not the only one that has heard strangers comment of the wretched condition of our main street. Again we have the extensive military programme in connection with Queen's University, which I understand will at least be started this year. What about a publicity commissioner? What about an up-to-date map of the city? Let the city fathers get busy and boost everything that will help to make the city grow, and we will yet arrive at that stage when we can speak with pride of the good old town and its progressive spirit.—Yours for a boost.—J. ### MOUNTAIN PRISON.

Judge Orders Convicted Forger Not to Visit City or Town. San Jose, Cal., Jan. 30.—Frank E. Murray, convicted forger, was sentenced by Superior Judge William Peasly to serve two years as hermit in the mountain cellules from here. Because Murray is 58 the judge was not inclined to give him a jail sentence. One of the conditions of the sentence is that Murray may accept employment, but he must not visit a city or town in two years. "What this man needs is to be kept away from temptation for a while," said Judge Peasly.

### LEPROSY IS SPREADING.

Isolation Held to be the Only Means of Combating It.

London, Jan. 30.—The spread of leprosy in Paris and throughout France generally recalls the estimate made recently by Dr. Bayon, leprosy research bacteriologist to the French African government, that there are at present "from twenty-five to fifty lepers, perhaps more," in England. Of these only one contracted the disease in the United Kingdom, simple precautions having proved sufficient to prevent contagion in the majority of instances.

In India, on the other hand, the last census shows an increase of lepers from 100,000 to 110,000 in ten years. Twenty-five years ago the principal medical officer at Basutoland counted 300 lepers in that country. He reported to the government on the matter, and asked for enforced segregation, expressing his belief that were preventive measures not taken the number of cases would double within twenty years. His advice was not acted upon, and last year a census showed 800 lepers in Basutoland.

Leprosy is undoubtedly contagious—though only to a slight degree—and a case is reported by Dr. Bayon of a girl who, directly and indirectly, injected twenty-eight persons. As the disease is notoriously incurable, early recognition and isolation are the only effective means of combating it.

### BANDITS SACK A CITY

Luan Chow Pillaged and Burned — Missionaries Safe. Shanghai, China, Jan. 29.—A force of 2,000 bandits to-day sacked and burned virtually the entire city of Luan Chow, in the province of Sgan-Hwei.

W. Entwistle, of the China Inland Mission, with his wife and children succeeded in escaping to Luchow-Fu, but the Catholic missionaries are still in the looted city, and it is believed they have been injured. The bandits apparently are connected with the bands commanded by "White Wolf," who have for a considerable time been ravaging the eastern part of the Province of Honan.

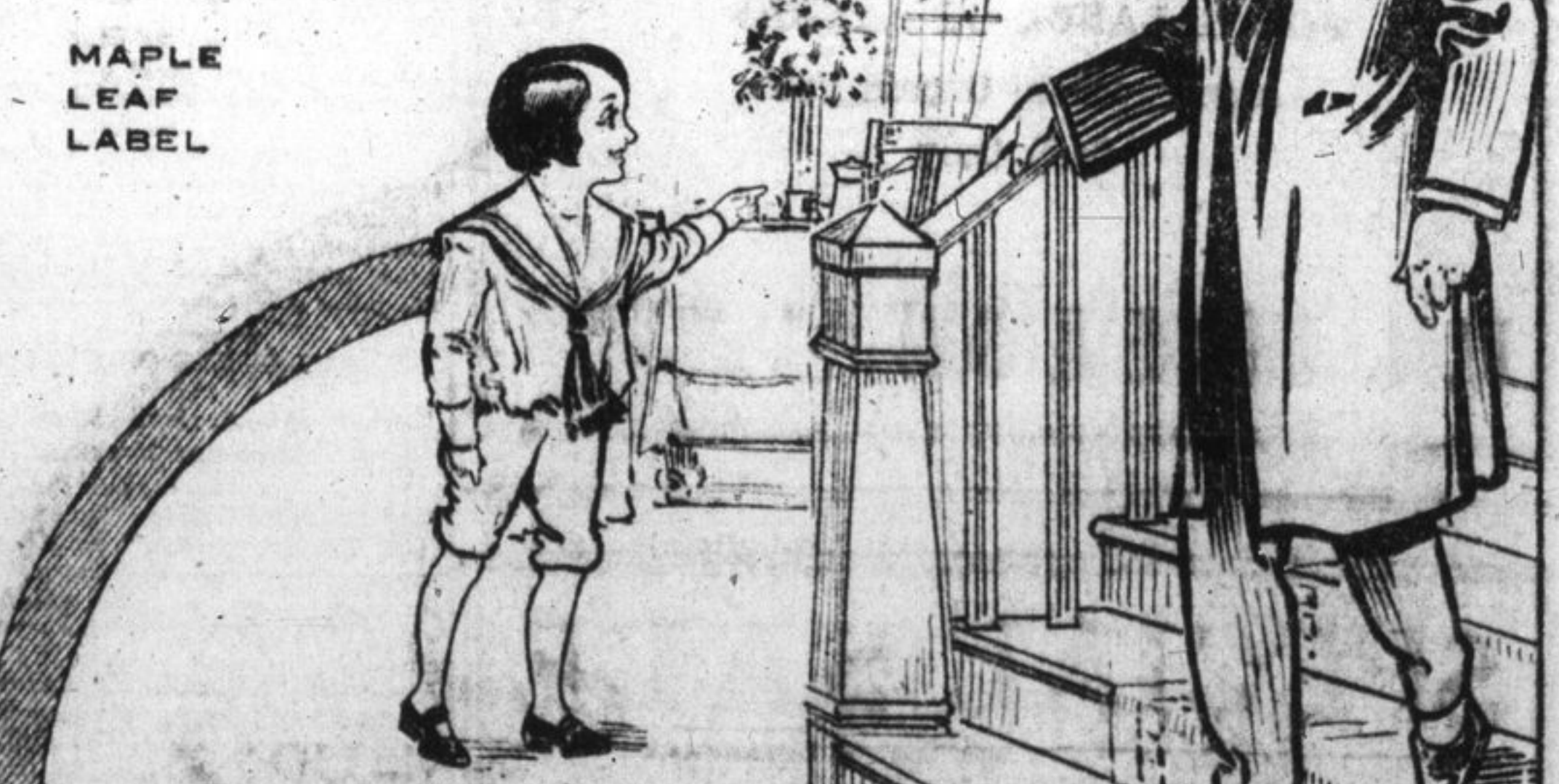
