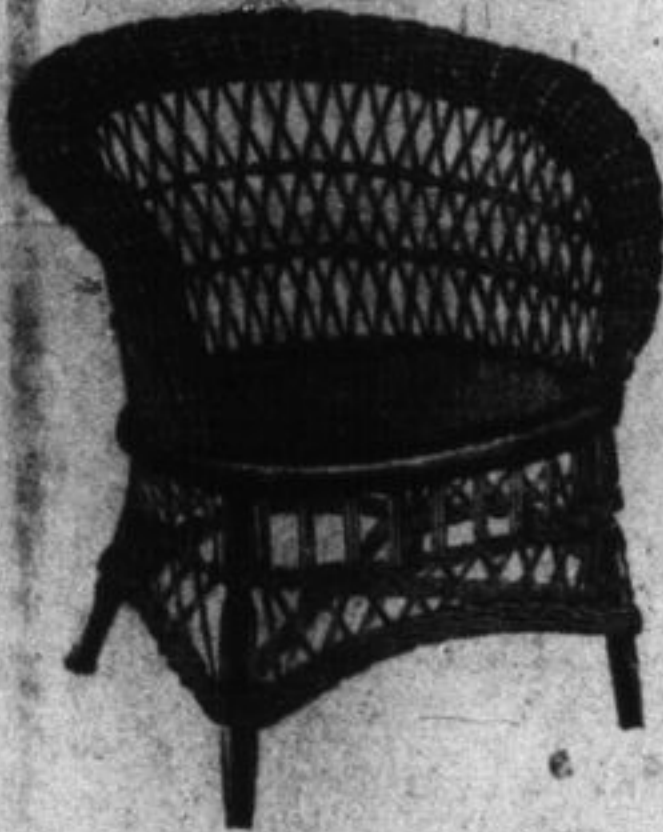

DRASTIC MEASURES URGED

To Fight Smallpox Epidemic at Niagara Falls

Albany, N.Y., Jan. 30.—In a telegram to Dr. Edward Clark, of Buffalo, a member of the state health council of the district in which Niagara Falls is located, Dr. Herman M. Biggs, the state health commissioner, urged drastic methods for fighting the smallpox epidemic in the latter city.

Pullman Evans, who is now in France.

TESTIFY AGAINST CANADA

Investigation Being Conducted by Committee of U.S. Senate

Washington, Jan. 29.—How Canada has paid the Western Newspaper Union \$42,000 a year for the last twelve years to circulate reading matter about the Dominion through the medium of "Patriot insides," which the Union furnishes to newspapers, was told to the Senate yesterday by George A. Joslyn, of Omaha, president of the Union, and Alfred Washington, its advertising manager.

Joslyn testified that the matter so circulated was marked "advertisement" and was designed to induce Americans to emigrate to Canada.

Washington testified under cross-examination that he did not think it unpatriotic nor disloyal to his country to circulate such matter.

ARISTOCRACY IN PERIL

Duke, Duchess and Lord Aboard Stranded Yacht.

New Orleans, La., Jan. 29.—The steam yacht Warrior, with Mr. and Mrs. F. W. Vanderbilt, the Duke and Duchess of Manchester and Lord Falconer aboard, was reported aground off the coast of Colombia by a United Fruit company wireless message received here.

The Warrior is 255 feet in length, 1,907 gross tonnage and is equipped with wireless. She was built at Troon, Scotland, in 1904.

More than 7,000 persons are homeless to-day in the district about St. Petersburg swept by the cyclone and the flood. Thousands of workmen are idle through the forced shut-down of manufacturing plants, and railroad and river traffic is at a standstill in many quarters.
