

Then an enthusiastic meeting was held at which strong resolutions on the subject of church unity were passed, urging Anglicans throughout the world to do all in their power to promote friendly relations with their fellow Christians of other religious bodies. Returning to Canada clergymen of Montreal and Toronto for two winters arranged for conferences with clergymen of other denominations at which the principles for which each stood were discussed. Following these, representative Anglican clergymen of Montreal and Toronto held a series of joint meetings to discuss the situation from the Anglican standpoint. After months of careful deliberation it was decided to endeavor to discover the mind of the church in regard to the matter under consideration. A letter suggesting two definite steps was sent out to forty clergymen of the different dioceses in Canada. Thirtythree signed their approval of the two propositions. It was then dethe fifteen hundred Anglican clergymen in Canada, preparatory to a petition to be sent to the general synod. Over three' hundred had signed the letter expressing approval of both suggestions, and many more of one or other of them, among the signers being two bishops. The primate of all Canada, the archbish-op of Rupert's Land, had written expressing sympathy.
