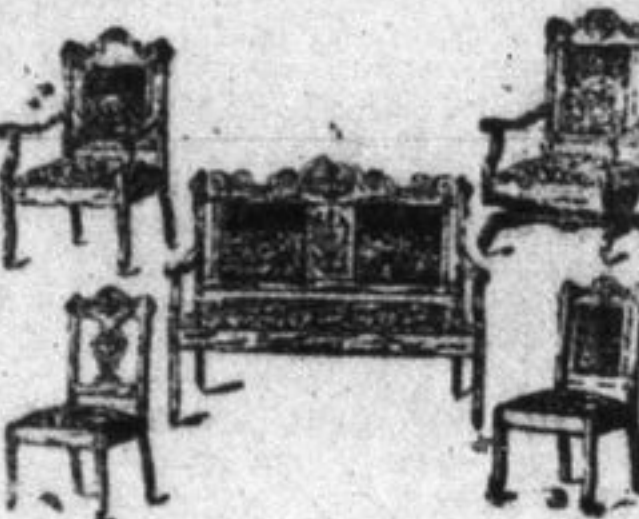

# LOST FINGER IN ROW

## MAN ACCUSED OF DOING BITING MUST STAND TRIAL

Charged That William Young Made Attack on John Banks on November 20th — Evidence Taken Before Justice of the Peace Hunter.

Justice of the peace George Hunter on Friday morning committed for trial William Young, on a charge of assault, causing bodily harm to John Banks, on Sunday, November 20th, 1913. Both parties live in Loughboro township. T. J. Rigney appeared for Young, and D. A. Givens for Banks. The accused was allowed out on bail.

Banks told his story, which was to the effect that on November 20th he drove to the home of J. Campson, accompanied by James Smith. White at Mr. Campson's place, they met Young and his friend who were sitting in the buggy and engaged in conversation with Young and Campson.

Banks said that Young charged him with having called him a "gump." He denied this charge, whereupon Young swore at him. Banks then told him to keep away, as he did not want to have any trouble.

"At this Young pulled off his coat and said he could 'lick' me," said Banks. "I again told him to keep away. Young then caught me by the coat and told me that I would have to fight. He tried to pull me out of the rig, and I had to get out. He threatened to hit me, and I hit him. We clinched, and he got my finger in his mouth. We were then separated, and he made another attack on me, but Campson stopped him."

Banks stated further that the second finger of his right hand was taken off two days after the injury occurred by Dr. Freeman and Sparks. He had not worked since he met with the injury, and was not able to.

James Smith, who was in the buggy with Banks, when the affair took place, was called and his evidence taken. It corroborated in every detail the story told by Banks. The complainant and Smith were the only witnesses called.
