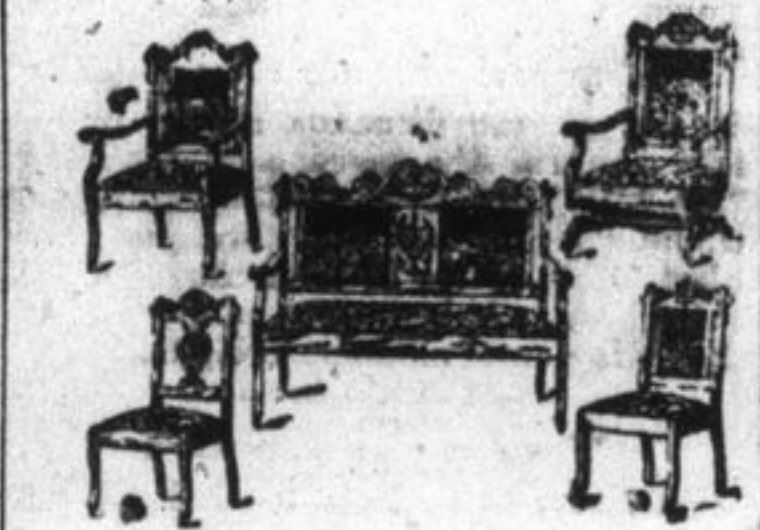

## VOICE OF THE PULPIT PARCEL POST SYSTEM

REV. DR. HANSON OF MONTREAL IN ST. ANDREW'S.

Rev. R. J. Bowen, Secretary of the Canadian Bible Society, Preached in St. James' Church.

Upon the subject of the uniqueness of the gospel of Jesus Christ, Rev. Dr. George Hanson, the masterly Montreal cleric, preached a scholarly sermon in St. Andrew's church on Sunday evening. By his earnestness and the simple, practical way in which he developed his discourse, the attention of the large congregation was riveted. The text was selected from Galatians 1:11-12: "But I certify you, brethren, that the gospel which was preached of me is not after man. For neither received it of man, neither was I taught it, but by the revelation of Jesus Christ." The true gospel, as Dr. Hanson remarked, is not derived from any human source, or fashioned from any human model. Ordination by man without the presence of the Holy Ghost is sacrilege, and he continued to show by illustrations the truth of the deep bridgeless chasm that yawns between the gospel of Christ and that of any other religious system.

He pointed to the doctrine of the atonement, which in the Christian conception of the gospel God makes the atonement, while with other systems man is the maker. Nothing can bring these together, said the preacher. "They do not spring from the same root. They are as far apart as heaven and earth."

At this point, Dr. Hanson made a fervent appeal for the individual putting his life-blood into his or her work. Referring to the missionary work, the preacher called for the dispensing of kid gloves by those engaged in the same. It is a principle of life, that if we are to redeem greatly we must suffer greatly.

Dr. Hanson's second illustration was the conditions of the gospel, and here he noted that with all other religions (making special reference to Mohammedanism) salvation is by human merit. In the face of this the doctrine referred his hearers to the Christian doctrine of free grace. Here he took occasion to say that the system of Rome, to a very large extent, is based upon salvation by human works. It is crowding out slowly, but surely, the evangelical truth in that church. Dr. Hanson concluded with a few comforting remarks upon the personal Saviourhood of Jesus Christ, the security of redemption he said being: "Come unto me and I will give thee rest."

At St. James' Church

"We need more faith—more faith in our Saviour, and more faith in our power to convert," Rev. R. J. Bowen, secretary of the Canadian Bible Society, declared in St. James church on Sunday morning. "We need the faith that will not shrink," he added. The speaker chose as his text, Romans, X, 17. "So then faith cometh, by hearing, and hearing by the word of God."

The world was moving today as it never did before and there was great need for missionary work. And yet there were many who when asked to help in missionary work, would state that they had no interest in this part of church work. They claimed they were so busy in affairs relative to their own church, that they had no time to devote towards sending the gospel to the uttermost parts of the world. Some even went so far as to state that there was no need of a Bible society.

The speaker referred to the grand and noble work being carried on by this society, in the distribution of bibles. The bible was being printed in every language, and in this way, was serving a great power for good, and assisting in bringing men and women to Christ.

At Calvary Church

There was a large congregation at Calvary church Sunday evening. Dr. Boyce spoke to the people on Daniel. There was special music. George Allan rendered "Face With Christ Our Saviour," in fine voice. Great praise is due Mr. Allan, choir leader, for his valuable service.

The Cigarette Evil

On Sunday evening, Rev. A. P. Mershon, pastor of Bethel Congregational church, preached on the subject of the cigarette evil of the present day. In opening his remarks the pastor stated that for one year during his life he had been a cigarette smoker. "I quit the habit and have never wanted to go back to it again," said the pastor, who stated that he learned to smoke under the college roof.

Mr. Mershon stated that some people might think the pulpit of a church is the wrong place to preach on such a subject, but he was of the opposite opinion. It was his aim to put himself upon record as being interested in the welfare of the boys of our city.

The cigarette evil is misjudged by the average man and woman of the community, said the pastor. The aim of the men in the business is to get the boys if the business is going to prosper. This is being done, which is shown by the increased number of cigarettes smoked by the people of North America during the past year. Whether the boys have enough money or not the rules of the business state that they can be furnished with a portion of a package if they are unable to buy the whole, said the preacher. "The day has arrived," said Mr. Mershon, "when the business men of our land refuse to engage men who are addicted to the cigarette evil."

Mr. Mershon gave the prescription of a noted doctor to cure the cigarette habit.

The Late Elijah Burke

The funeral of the late Elijah Burke, who passed away very suddenly at his home at Oso station, took place on Saturday morning at 10 o'clock, and was one of the largest funerals ever held in that district. Deceased was well known all over the district, and very highly respected. Rev. F. Williamson of Christ church officiated at the service, assisted by Rev. A. E. Smart, of Kingston. The members of Loyal Orange lodge No. 247, of which deceased was a member, had charge of the funeral. The members of the order attended in a body.

## IT WILL GO INTO EFFECT ON TUESDAY

The Places to be Covered by the System in the Kingston District — The Rates to be Charged — Will Cover a Radius of Twenty Miles.

The parcel post regulations will go into effect Monday at midnight. Messrs Murray and Hebert, appointed to look after the distribution of the parcels in Kingston, will commence their work on Tuesday.

The system will take in a radius of twenty miles and will include the following outside places:

- Asseltine, Atkinson, Allan, Bath, Barrie, Brick Lake, Battersea, Bragg's Mills, Berryton, Ballantyne, Chambers, Camden East, Colbrook, Collin's Bay, Cataraqui, Cushehall, Central, Darcy, Desert Lake, Dufferin, Emerald, Enterprise, Elginburg, Eric, Fellows, Glenvale, Glenburnie, Ganaoquo, Gananoque Junction, Garden Island, Hawley, Holdeford, Harrington, Harrowsmith, Howe Island, Inverary, Joyceville, Kepler, Kingston Station, Keelerville, Kingston Mills, Kilbourn, Lake Opinicon, Latimer, Leeds, Leland, Morven, Millhaven, Moscow, Murrill, Maple Lawn, Mount Chesney, Newburg, Odessa, Oates, Petworth, Pittserry, Perth Road, Raitton, Steels, Switzer, Sharbot, Sydenham, Sunbury, Sharbot Lake, St. Lawrence, Simcoe Island, Thorp, Taylor, Violet, Verona, Wilton, Williamsville, Wolfe Island, Willelsholme, Westbrook, Yarker.

The two men who will look after the distribution of parcels in Kingston will be provided with a rig.

These two men will conduct the business for three months as a trial, when the work will be awarded by contract.
