### THE ONLY WAY.

A Fine Interpretation Given by Martin Harvey.  
Martin Harvey and his English company closed its brief season in Kingston on Saturday evening, when it presented "The Only Way," a dramatization of Dickens' story of "The Tale of Two Cities." The play was splendidly staged, the setting of each act being suggestive of the time, the modern producers of English plays.  
Mr. Harvey's was, of course, the leading character, that of Sidney Carton, the jockey, the man of brilliant intellect, who was willing to serve Stryver, his master, with unvarying meekness, while he stifled his ambitions in his cups and brooded over his misfortune. The story is pathetic, and it loses none of its pathos and beauty in the play. All of the scenes were skillfully presented—the English garden, the Bastille in Paris, the revolutionary tribunal, the cell and hall in congregate—which in the tableaux the words of Carton linger in the memory: "It is a far better thing that I do than I have ever done. It is a far better rest that I go to than I have ever known."  
The company is large and well balanced. All of its members are good and give the most acceptable support to its star.
