THE BOARD OF TRADE

TO CONSIDER HOLDING WEEK'S CARNIVAL IN KINGSTON

The Entertainment is Offered by the Chataqua Company — R. Meek Was Re-Elected President of the Board.

The entertainment committee of the Board of Trade has the matter of a week's carnival of Bedeath Chataqua system now before its attention. The board has approved of it and referred it to the entertainment committee.

George S. Dalgety, of New York, stated his proposition before the members at their monthly meeting on Tuesday night. He reviewed the success of these one-week entertainments of the Chataqua system, and of the continued approval of people in cities and towns where the company operates. This summer, probably towards the last of July, Mr. Dalgety hopes to open the carnival here. He wishes to secure Kingston with Cornwall on this side of the line. The programme provided for one week's first-class entertainment, of music, comedy, drama, etc., in a large tent provided.

Mr. Dalgety said these Chataquas, for which the system has many bookings for the coming season, have proven to be both city boosters and city advertisers. They bring large crowds to town during the week. The talent is the best obtainable and the presenters make use of judicious advertising. The Chataquas have been operators for seven years.

In return for this the city is asked to provide grounds, and to sell 750 season tickets, and guarantee the sale of these up to \$500.

Ald. Harrison spoke in favor of the Chataquas, and a motion was passed to the effect that the board approved of it and referred it to the entertainment committee. Season tickets at \$2 will admit the holder to any and all shows during the week.

The Annual Meeting

The annual meeting of the board is due in March. Accordingly nominations for next year's officers were made on Tuesday evening.
