IEWS OF EARTHQUAKE

REAL SHOCK OCCURRED IN ARCTIC REGIONS

Says Winnipeg Expert — Montreal and Toronto Opinions Differ—Quake May Have Been Near. Ottawa, Feb. 11.—Professor Klotz made the following statement late yesterday: "A fairly severe earthquake was recorded at the observatory at 1.31 o'clock. The earth oscillated for three minutes, as shown by the instruments, and the distance to the epicentre is 110 kilometres, or 69 miles.

Quake Near at Hand

Montreal, Feb. 11.—Prof. Lloyd, professor of botany at McGill, who has had experience with earthquakes in California, set the time of the shock here at 1.32, and the duration as two minutes. He said the wave seemed to be from north-west to south-east. This he was able to determine with two spoons placed at right angles on a table.

He thought the centre of shock must have been within a few hundred miles, as the vibration was so nearly vertical. Had the centre been further away, the earth wave would have been more horizontal instead of up and down.

The Toronto Report

Toronto, Feb. 11.—The report issued from Toronto observatory says: Two pronounced earthquake shocks were registered in the seismograph at Toronto observatory, the first at 11.39 a.m. and the second at 1.29 p.m. The estimated distance of the first one was 600 miles east of Toronto and the second was quite close. It was worse near Hamilton and St. Catharines.

Occurred in Arctic

Winnipeg, Feb. 11.—The Rev. Father Flain, of St. Boniface college, surmises that the shock occurred in the Arctic regions.
