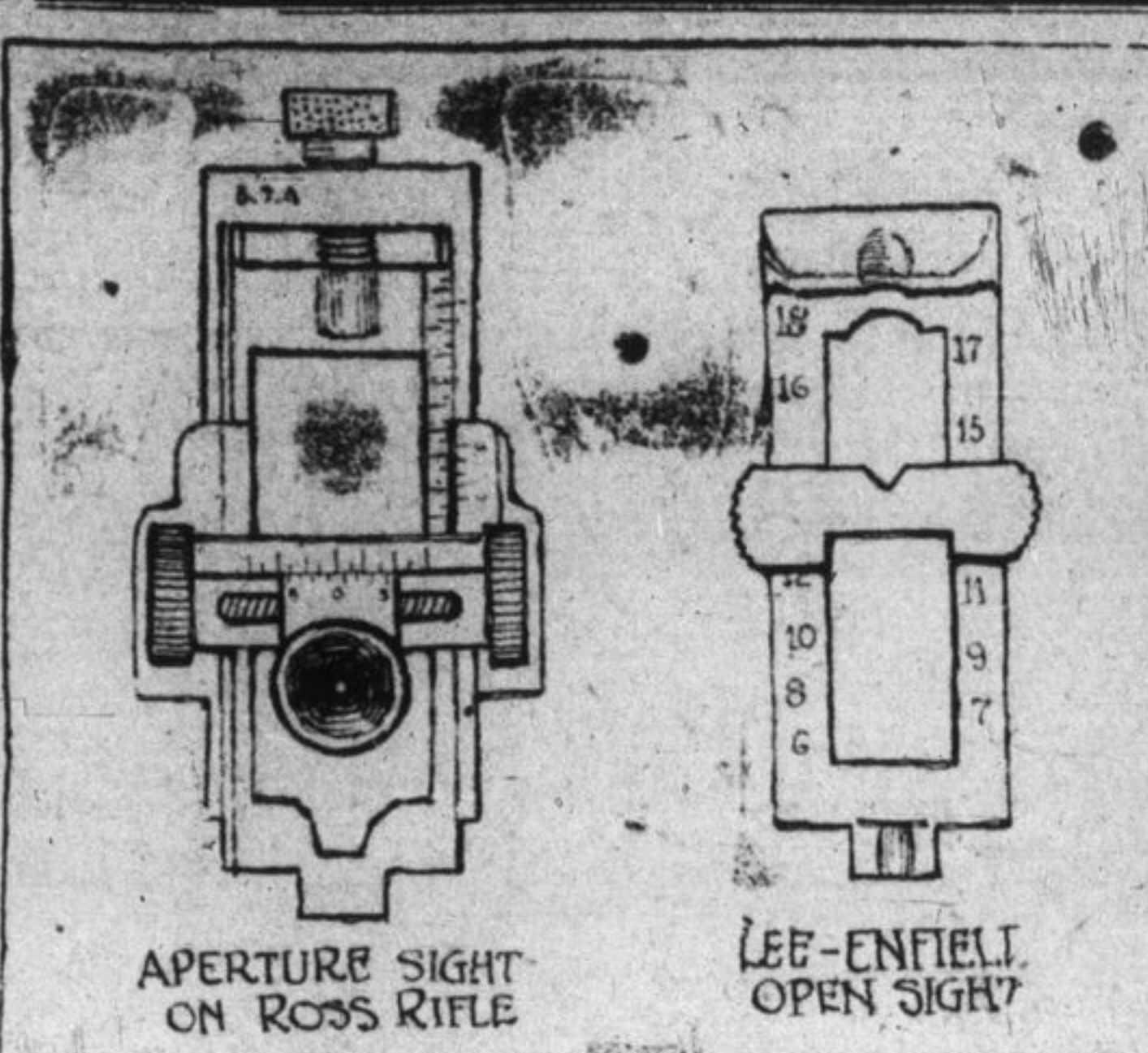
At Perth Road

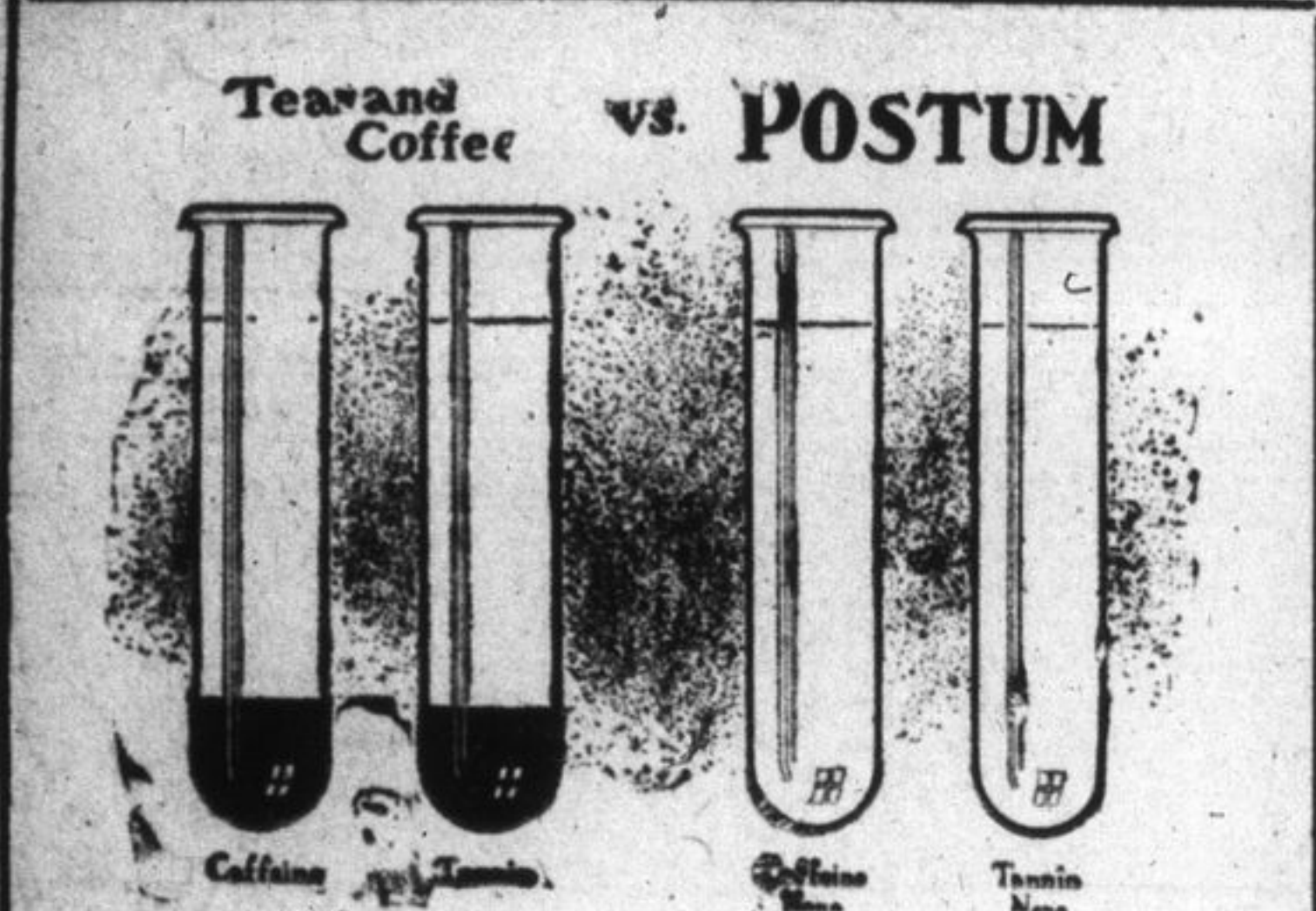
