**LOOT THEIR VICTIMS**

**WOMEN, AS GENERAL RULE, ARE NOT GOOD GAMBLERS.**

Carried Away and Maddened by Desire for Gain, They Play Recklessly.

"Few women are good gamblers. They are carried away and maddened by the desire for gain, and bridge coming as a 'society' game reaches them. It has developed a class of female card sharps that furnishes the police with a new problem.

Chicago police have listed nearly two score clubs where women sharpers, some backed by men gamblers, loot their victims. The police despair of closing them, as most of them operate under 'charity' guises. There are at least four Chicago women who make a profession of bridge specializing in posing as society women in order to play at the larger summer and winter resorts.

"The extent to which gambling at bridge has spread among women it is alarming, but it is impossible to secure statistics. There was a suicide of a Chicago man not long ago after which it was learned his wife had been losing from \$100 to \$1,500 a week for more than a year in a 'friendly club.'

**TIDINGS FROM PICTON**

**Sudden Death of Mrs. Charles May**

Lock on Wednesday

Picton, Feb. 12.—Picton is sharing in the terrible cold snap reported throughout the province, the thermometer registering 20 below zero yesterday morning and as low as 25 below this morning.

No ill effects are reported in Picton from the earthquake on Tuesday afternoon though the tremor was distinctly felt by many of the residents.

A terribly sudden death took of the wife of Charles Haylock early on Wednesday morning. The previous day she did her work as usual and was out at a religious service in the evening, where she felt unwell, went home and passed away before morning. Heart failure was the cause of death.

At the parish house of the Anglican church, Picton, last evening, the congregation held a reunion and reception to the newly appointed rector, Rev. F. L. Barber. Over 200 sat down to a sumptuous tea. After tea one of the churchwardens, R. E. Wright, presided at a pleasant and harmonious meeting. Rector Blagrove, of Belleville, was the speaker of the evening. An address of welcome to the rector and his good wife was read by D. J. Shannon, seconded by A. E. Wilson, and passed unanimously, to which the rector suitably replied.

**Fingers Crushed Through Conductor Slamming Door**

Ottawa, Feb. 13.—Hon. George E. Foster met with a painful accident on his way home from the House of Commons yesterday morning. He was boarding a street car and the conductor, who did not notice that any one was at the door, shut it smartly upon Mr. Foster's fingers crushing them so badly that it will be some little time before Mr. Foster will be able to be in the house.

**Finland's Barometric Stone**

It is said that there is to be found in Finland a kind of stone that actually foretells changes in the weather. In dry, fine weather the stone shows a dark gray color and when white spots, but before approaching showers or thick mists it blackens all over—most conspicuously, of course, at the spaces which were previously white—and gradually returns to its former state as the weather improves.

Its prophetic warnings are regarded by many Finlanders as having a supernatural origin but a recent analysis of the stone explained the cause and shows there is nothing whatsoever mysterious in its action. It is composed of a granular mass of clay and fossiliferous organic matter with a little rock salt and nitre scattered throughout in grains and small patches. These salts absorb the aerial moisture as it increases in amount and dissolve in it, forming their white color as the drier atmosphere evaporates the moisture from black surface films, while they regain them.

**TREES FOR PRAIRIES.**

**Government Helps Prairie Farmers Establish Woodlots.**

For several years over two and a half million tree seedlings and cuttings have been distributed annually to the prairie farmers by the Dominion Government Forest Nursery Station at Indian Head. For the first eight months of the present year, almost twelve thousand letters of inquiry were received by this Nursery Station and the demand for seedlings this year has so taxed the capacity of the nursery that it has been found necessary to establish a branch nursery near Saskatoon.

The young trees are supplied only to bona fide farm-owners in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, and then only in small lots not exceeding 500 seedlings in any one year. Applications must be made on suitable forms supplied by the Forest Nursery Station. A charge of \$1 per hundred for containers, made, no order for less than 100 of any one species being taken.

The success of western tree-plantations depends not so much on the climatic conditions, as is erroneously supposed, but rather on the care taken with the delicate young seedlings before and after planting. To show the farmers how best to obtain successful results with their plantations, nine inspectors of tree-planting are maintained by the Dominion Government in these provinces, and several bulletins bearing on this work has been issued by the Forestry Branch at Ottawa, and can be had on application.

The principal trees planted in the West are ash, maple, cottonwood, willow and Russian poplar. The first two do well together, and ash especially is much in favor with the farmers, having probably the lowest death rate of any. Willow and poplar are usually supplied as cuttings and do well together. The Russian willow is growing in popularity with the farmers on account of its ease of propagation. Its quick-growing qualities, hardiness and freedom from disease. That spruce, larch (tamarack), and Scotch pine will also do well on the prairies is no longer questionable.

The best results are in all cases attained by planting the trees in the spring in beds at least twenty yards wide on well-prepared soil, such as summer-fallow, or garden land, the trees being spaced about four feet apart and in rows to permit machine cultivation in order to protect the soil from weeds and evaporation until the trees grow large enough for their branches to meet.

**A Good Word for Lennox.**

Before Justice Haughton Lennox succeeded the Ontario Bench, and Mr. G. A. Little became Registrar of the Surrogate Court for Simcoe County, both were, it is almost needless to say, in politics, the former as Conservative member for the Federal riding of South Simcoe, and the latter as a P.P. for the corresponding Provincial riding, then known as Cardwell, but now also called, South Simcoe. A Dominion election was on, and Mr. Little, in the house, was accompanying his Federal confere on a canvassing tour of the riding. Meeting one yeoman whom they both recognized as a supporter in former contests, Mr. Little alighted from the buggy and, after greeting him, ventured the supposition that his vote would be counted upon for Mr. Lennox.

The farmer, however, did not give a ready assent. "I've been thinking, Mr. Little," he said, "that I'd sooner see South Simcoe represented by a practical man. I think we're best sending too many of these smart lawyers to Parliament."

Mr. Little looked round cautiously to see that Mr. Lennox was out of earshot, and then, lowering his voice, confidentially replied: "Well, if that's all that's worrying you, you needn't hesitate to vote for Lennox, for he's really not much of a lawyer anyway."

**He Played Spare.**

The younger generation of Canadian cricketers, Hon. Col. Sam Hughes, Minister of Militia, and James L. Hughes, ex-chief inspector of Toronto's schools, were famous lacrosse players in their youth. In his autobiography now appearing in serial form "Jim" Hughes tells of his last game.

"Four years after I gave up playing lacrosse, I received a telegram stating that I was to go to Montreal with Sam to a match with the Samcocks. Sam and I were in Durham county. We drove sixteen miles to Bowmanville, and after the train had started and I was going too fast for me to risk jumping off I was told that I was 'spare' man. It was really a dreadful trial.

"I saw our team beaten three straight games in fifteen short matches. The papers in Montreal said next day that the victory would not have been won so easily if I had been playing. This gave a little relief to me."

**Open Columbia River.**

Dominion surveyors who have been engaged during the past season making an investigation of the Upper Columbia river to determine the feasibility of opening a shipping route to the water, are compiling their findings to make a report to the Government. Canada is interested in opening an economical all water route as an outlet to the great wheat crop, and to open a market for the great coal deposits and to compete for the oil trade of the northwest when the industry reaches a producing basis.

**Ship Without Under Water Propellers**

Charles Bethune of Sydney, N.S., announces that he has completed a model of a ship without propellers or any kind of machinery under the water line. He says the invention is practical for ocean liners and that one so equipped could make the passage from St. Paul's Island to Landy Island, England, in fifty hours.

**A CIVIL SERVICE KNIGHT.**

**Sir Joseph Pope Alone Has Achieved That Honor.**

Among the civil servants of the Dominion there is only one who bears the title of Knight. That one is Sir Joseph Pope, Under Secretary of State for External Affairs. Nor does he flaunt his title in the face of the public, says Francis A. Carman in Toronto Star Weekly. Look up his department in the telephone directory of Ottawa and you will find him down as plain "Joseph Pope." But just as a matter of simple historic fact he does occupy this unique position, and he does not occupy it without justification. He is Knight Commander of the Order of St. Michael and St. George for the very good reason that he has been able in a number of instances to perform outstanding services for the Dominion, and he has been able to perform these outstanding services because he possessed qualifications which are exceedingly rare on this side of the Atlantic.

The central fact of these special qualifications is a knowledge of the "several" of official life. He knows how to do things. He knows his way around Government offices, and he knows his way around royal courts. He is an authority on the etiquette of official and court circles, a branch of knowledge which is highly valued even by our democratic community. Of course, he did not pick this up in a day.
