## THE MEDICAL SOCIETY AT THE POLICE COURT THE ONTARIO SYNOD

### DOES NOT WANT DOCTORS NAMES IN PAPERS

#### When They Attend at Accidents and Perform Operations — It Also Frowns Upon the Practice of Fee-Splitting.

The Kingston Medical and Surgical association met on Monday evening with twenty-four members present. Dr. W. G. Anglin, the retiring president introduced the incoming president, Dr. R. J. Gardiner, who shortly addressed the members. Drs. Third, Gardiner, Anglin, Morrison and Bogart presented short reports on clinical cases of interest. A prolonged discussion then took place on the question of the splitting of a fee; a practice which now prevails to some extent in most of the larger towns and cities and is known to be somewhat practised here. After full discussion the following motions were carried almost unanimously. 1. That this association desires to place on record its unreserved condemnation of the practice of fee-splitting. 2. That any member of this association found guilty of this practice (of fee-splitting) shall thereby forfeit his membership. The following motion met with the unanimous approval of the members:— That the Kingston Medical and Surgical associations respectfully request the city newspapers to leave out the names of attending physicians and surgeons in their reports of accidents, operations or other cases of sickness.

### WENT INTO SESSION ON TUESDAY AT NOON

#### Bishop Mills Presided and Addressed the Synod — He Will Assist the Bishop of Kingston.

At noon on Tuesday, the forty-ninth session of the incorporated synod of the diocese of Ontario opened in Synod hall, with Bishop Mills presiding. The attendance of clergy and lay delegates was very large, the majority of delegates being expected in the afternoon trains. Rev. W. F. Fitzgerald said prayer. Bishop Mills said he was glad of having the opportunity of welcoming the delegates to synod. Some time ago, he thought that he would not have this privilege, but he was happy to say that God has seen fit to restore, in a measure, his health and strength. While not fully recovered from his illness, he was in a fair way to recovery. He had been preaching for some time, he fancied with as much power as he ever possessed. This had been the means of inspiring him, and he suggested that he take over a portion of the charges to be visited. He had suggested that he take over the deanery of Prince Edward county, the southern part of Kingston deanery, and the southern part of Lennox and Addington. This would take all the district south of Toronto road.

His lordship stated that his health had not been impaired by his preaching, and it had been a great pleasure for him. Continuing, Bishop Mills stated that he would not deliver a charge this session and he, therefore, took this opportunity of making these few remarks. It was his intention to assist the Bishop of Kingston at these sessions. Bishop Bidwell had at all times shown excellent care towards him in his illness. Bishop Mills made a reference to his last charge, when he had a few words to say on political matters. After reading the charge he had been accused of being a dyed-in-the-wool Tory, by others as an unreasonable agitator, and still others said that he was on the fence, and perhaps the latter were nearer right.

His lordship remarked that all political parties are bad, but stated that there was a good man at the head of the present government. Synod re-elected Canon Grout as clerical secretary, Francis King as lay secretary and R. J. Carson as treasurer. R. J. Carson, the treasurer, submitted his report, and in doing so stated that the funds of the synod were in good shape, and that the synod had every reason to be congratulated on the state of the funds. The report was regarded as a most encouraging one by the members of synod. Rural Dean Jones, in moving the adoption of the report, congratulated Mr. Carson on the splendid showing.

The receipts for the year ending December 31st, 1913, show gross income of about 57-16 per cent, after deducting expenses, a dividend of five per cent, for the year has been paid, leaving a credit balance of \$500.29. The consolidated fund was given as \$41,422.66; debentures, \$57,017.50; mortgages, \$408,608.62. On December, 31st, this fund stood at \$401,237.76, showing an increase of \$7,080.86. Receipts on account of consolidated fund, \$23,294.26, less debit last year of \$265.72, leaving \$22,028.54. The capital of the episcopal fund is now
