## MAMMOTH ICE JAM

### THE BIGGEST IN MEMORY OF OLD RIVERMEN.

#### Extends for Twelve Miles — Ice Blown Out of Bays and is Piled Up From Shore to Shore—People Using Ice Bridge.

Mansona, N. Y., Feb. 18.—On account of the blustering ice getting lodged near Cornwall last Thursday, the south channel of the St. Lawrence river is now filled in a solid jam from that place to the head of Delaney's island, a distance of nearly 12 miles.

The heavy winds of the past week blew the ice out of the bays along the river and there is now an ice bridge from Long Sault island to the main shore, over which the farmers from the island are driving.

At Barnhart's island, just below Long Sault island, the water is very swift, most of the water from Long Sault rapids flowing between Barnhart's and Long Sault and going down the south channel. At present the river at that place is frozen almost across, there still being a small channel next to the main shore.

The ice crowding and jamming together is piled many feet high in places and is quite a sight, many people driving down to see it.

Men have been working along the river all winter trying to keep the channel open, but now that it is jammed in, the old river men say it will undoubtedly stay frozen till spring. Although the St. Lawrence river usually freezes over in places it is quite unusual for it to form a jam for so great a distance. In fact many living along the river do not remember it ever filling in up above Delaney's island where it now is.

## AN OLDEN FARMER WRITES

### About Council Taking Down a Line Fence

Mountain Grove, Feb. 17.—(To the Editor): I was somewhat interested in the taking down of the farmers' fences in the township of Olden to make convenient roads for lumber jobbers by the township council, and having had some experience in municipal affairs I was anxious to hear something, so I attended the nomination meeting to hear the fence business talked over. It was certainly interesting. It is the first time I ever saw a member of a township council sit in the audience and call old men liars when they were speaking. I was so interested that I visited the actual spot where the line fence between the two farmers' fields had been taken down twice by order of the township council, once in March last and again in October last, allowing all the cattle in the country to run at large in those farmers' fields.

I found that one Jackson owned a timber lot in the 5th concession of Olden, and that the public road ran across this lot right past the buildings. I also found that Jackson had let the job of lumbering of the timber to Card brothers, of Mountain Grove. These men wanted to go through the farmers' fields on level ground and strike the public road at the nearest point. The farmers objected without some remuneration for it. Then they bargained with the council that if they could not get a road for ten dollars the council was to take down a line fence that had been in place for thirty-five years and public roads crossing the lots on either side.

Now, for the benefit of your many interested readers in those townships where roads cannot be built on the allowances and lands have to be taken for public roads across the farmers' lots, the legislature has enacted as follows, in section 493, chap. 43, Municipal Act, where a highway for the site of which compensation was not paid has been laid out and opened in the place of the whole or any part of an original allowance for road, the owner of the land appropriated for the highway or his successor in title if he owns the land which abuts on such allowance shall be entitled to the soil and freehold of it and if it has not already been conveyed to him or his predecessor, in title to a conveyance of it. Where the land which so abuts is owned by more persons than one, each shall be entitled to and to a conveyance of the soil and freehold of that part of the allowance upon which his lands abut to the middle line of the allowance.

I find no one has ever used this road where the fence was taken down, that it is over a hill and on a side hill and no lumberman would draw lumber over a hill when he could go across on level ground for a trifle, and why the council wish to make themselves a party to a job like that I cannot understand. A lot of the farmer's taxes have been appropriated for nothing, and they have certainly by their acts left the corporation to pay the damage.—A FARMER.

## WOULD WATCH WAGES

### Proposes Duty to Preserve Standard Rate in Canada

Ottawa, Feb. 18.—J. H. Burnham (West Peterboro) has given notice of a tariff resolution in the commons which presents one phase of the protectionist argument and will probably provoke considerable debate if it is ever reached on the order paper this session. Mr. Burnham asks the house to declare that "it is desirable that manufactured goods and natural products coming from any other country where the rate of wages of those employed in the making or raising of the same is below that prevailing in Canada be subjected to a tariff duty sufficient to preserve the standard or rate of wages of those in Canada employed in making or producing like goods and products."

Ottawa, Feb. 18.—In regard to the latest news from Bisley, I need only say that Canadian riflemen are greatly pleased that they will now be allowed to shoot for the principal Bisley event and the only one about which we were greatly concerned — the king's prize, as it appears likely we will now be in a position to do, in my opinion," said Colonel Sam Hughes, minister of militia.

## LOSES MAIN CROP

### St. Lawrence River Ice Company Unable to Harvest

Cape Vincent, N. Y., Feb. 18.—The present winter, up to this time, has been a very bad one for the harvesting of ice. Early in the winter the river frozen over but the ice did not last very long, as it was broken up by the heavy winds that prevailed at that time. Shortly after the ice from the lake began to come into the river, and when this was cemented together by the cold weather it left a surface that was very uneven, and almost impossible to get about on. This ice, which is anywhere from one to five feet in thickness, can not be harvested to advantage, and on this account the St. Lawrence River Ice company will not operate its plant for the filling of cars. The two large houses of the company, however, will be filled with the best ice that can be secured. The company being unable to operate its plant will mean a loss to the workmen of the village of from five or six thousand dollars besides a pecuniary loss to the members of the company.

The Booth Fisheries company which uses a large quantity of ice during the summer season, is also hard hit by the unfavorable harvesting conditions. It is quite necessary that the large houses of the company be filled, and in order to get the ice, Manager John K. Kilborn has made arrangements to have it cut in Button Bay, about a mile across the river, and drawn to this place on sleds. This ice is anywhere from a foot to 15 inches thick, of excellent quality, and will handle nicely. The getting of the ice from across the river will mean work for a great many teams and an extra large force of men. The work of getting things in readiness for the harvest was started this morning. It is quite probable that the other ice houses in the village will be filled with the ice from across the river.

## JOHN BULL DISCIPLINED

### Published Discreditible Story in Connection With Murder

London, Feb. 18.—Severe strictures were passed on the action of John Bull in trying to work up a journalistic story in connection with the North London train murder of yesterday's hearing of the capital charge against John Starchfield, the father of the dead boy. A witness named Moore told of having gone to see the editor of John Bull and offering to dispose of his story before seeing the police. He said he received payment as well as the assurance that he would be looked after and that he need not trouble the police.

Magistrate Biron commented that the story was a most discreditible one; even assuming the evidence was true, he declared that the story could not be made discreditible. The hearing in the case has been further adjourned.

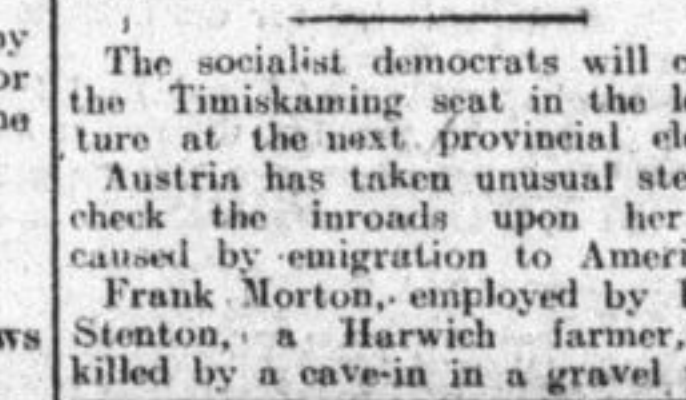
