EXCUSES BEING MADE

FOR DEFEAT OF MASTERMAN, BETHNEL GREEN

The Asquith Government Will Set About to Amend Some Clauses in the Insurance Act.

London, Feb. 21.—This is English liberalism's black week and the various excuses made by party orators are more interesting for their ingenuity than convincing. The South Bucks election, with an increased liberal vote, was satisfactory. Bethnel Green chances diminished day by day, but up to the last moment no man refused to believe that Masterman's seat was in real danger. The defeat of a cabinet minister is always a blow to the prestige of the ministry, and the Westminster Gazette says:

"We should be paying Masterman a very poor compliment if we did not admit that to get his scalp is a feat of arms, or a feat of tomahawks, which may justly give satisfaction to those who have achieved it." The popular result with an enormously decreased liberal majority is also disastrous to the prestige. Both Bethnel Green and Poplar are purely industrial communities, a poor type, with an overwhelming majority of inadequately paid workers.

Some leading Bethnel Green liberals maintain that a factor in Masterman's defeat was dissatisfaction over the Welsh disestablishment bill. The Bethnel Green result will probably quicken the government's activity in amending clauses of the insurance act dealing with the casual laborer; so as to remove factors which now make the insurance a difficulty in the way of obtaining casual employment.

MORE GOOD SETTLERS

Farmers From Illinois to Come Into Canada

That the publicity campaign now being carried on by Alberta is bearing the right kind of fruit appears to be well established in a letter received from J. L. Porte, who has been in charge of the Edmonton and Central Alberta exhibits that have been touring many of the states during the past few months. He says:

"On my visit to Virginia, Springfield, Chesterfield, Mason City, Peoria, and Chatsworth, I met a number who are interested and who come to Edmonton in the spring.

We will have three good settlers from Virginia in July. From Chatsworth we will have a party of nine who will come to Edmonton on the last of May. We will also have a good party from Mason City.

"On my return to the city I had two invitations, one from Joliet and one from Gardner, Ill., asking me to go and give them some information on our country. I wired them I would go on Sunday to meet them, and they met me at the station, and some of the farmers drove in seven miles. One man had decided to come with his car of settler's effects and ten head of Jersey cows. These parties are all well to do. This will only be the start of a big immigration from Illinois, as the landlords are raising the rents on the tenants, although they are getting from \$6 to \$15 per acre rent. It does not pay them interest on capital invested after paying their taxes, which are very heavy."

The electors of Newboro will vote on a by-law on March 16th to decide the question of housing the Ontario Milling and Manufacturing Co., which company intend re-opening the canning factory. A bonus of \$200 per year for ten years is contemplated, with the usual "fixed assessment, etc."

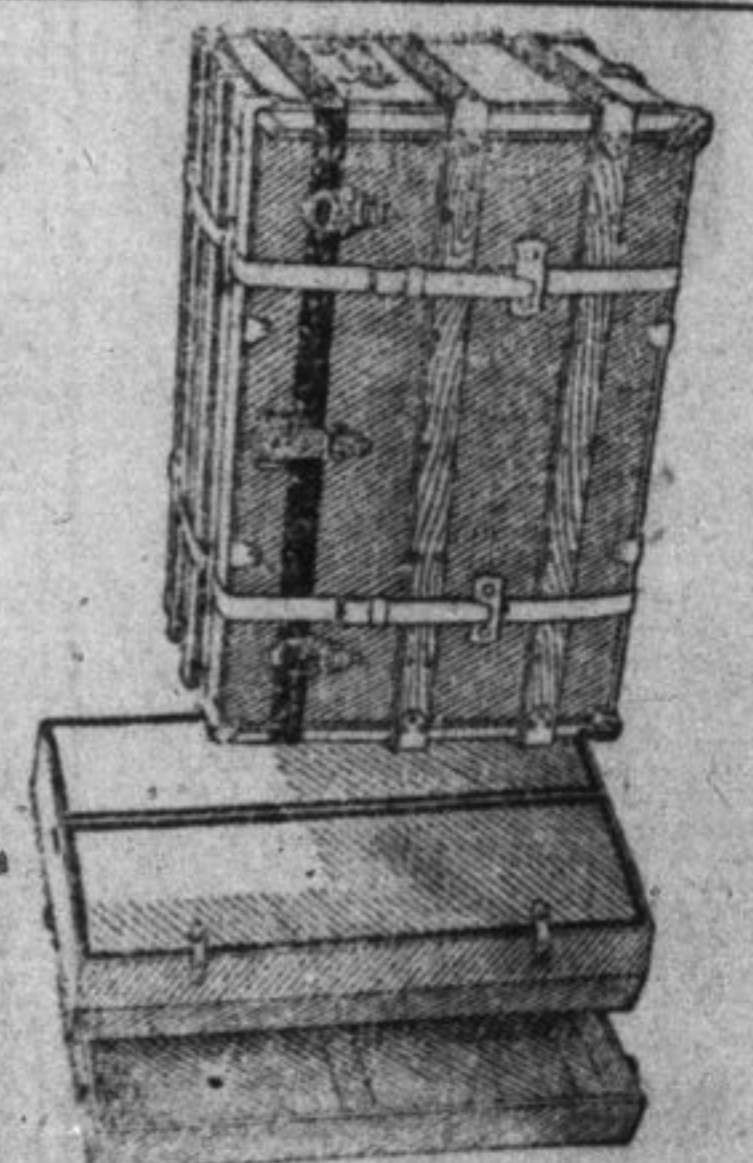
