THE MELTING POT AGE ANNIVERSARY SUNDAY STUDENTS DISAPPEAR

IN WHICH SYSTEMS ARE BEING SEARCHED.

Sermon by Rev. Dr. Wallace, of Westmount, Who Also Addressed the Evangelical Alliance on Monday Morning.

A large and enthusiastic gathering was addressed in Convocation Hall on Sunday afternoon by Dr. O. C. S. Wallace, of Westmount, Que., who spoke upon "The Calling of the Wide World," and based his subject upon Psalm lxxii. Dr. Wallace opened his address by saying that this text is not the language of geography but of purpose, that is, here is a call to the world's consciousness. This world consciousness will also teach us that this is the age of the melting pot. Systems of thought and human institutions, which have been built up through the centuries, are being searched to their foundations. This world consciousness will also make us aware of the titanic conflicts now in progress.

The preacher cited specially the conflict between Christianity and Mohammedanism, and the present attack upon the Christian churches by the industrial and social forces. Besides the world's consciousness, there should be on the part of the privileged young men of our universities a world wide thought. Even though a man serve in a narrow parish, or in a circumscribed province, he is not qualified for the fullest service, unless he realizes the present task is related to world interests. The speaker pointed out that there was need also of a world character. Not in a hundred years has the use of men of great calibre been so acute as now, and not in a hundred years have the forces making against the production of such an end been so many and so diverse.

Addressed Evangelical Alliance

Monday Dr. Wallace addressed a meeting of the Evangelical Alliance in the Y.M.C.A. parlors, and this time his subject was "Ideals in the Pulpit." The speaker laid stress upon the importance of the teaching function of the ministry, and dwelt upon three ideals in detail that need to be found in the pulpit message of to-day. These ideals are God, Salvation and Doom. With regard to God it was pointed out that while the hell fire preaching of the last generation is no longer heard the truths upon which it rested are still supported by experience and science, and need to be interpreted in terms of these to the present generation.

WAS OBSERVED IN BROCK STREET METHODIST CHURCH

Rev. George Edwards, of Athens, Preached at Both Services — W. Dobson, of Queen's, Spoke to the Brotherhood in the Afternoon.

Brock Street Methodist church celebrated its anniversary on Sunday, the preacher for the occasion being a former pastor, the Rev. George Edwards, of Athens. The sermons at both services were inspiring and of practical personal application.

Rev. John Webster the pastor, conducted the morning service but preached at the Wolfe Island church in the evening. Before the Brotherhood in the afternoon W. Dobson, of Queen's championship hockey team gave an address on Christianity in athletics.

Special anniversary music was rendered by the choir, and the organist, Clare Smith. Anthems were given. E. Tisdale sang a solo in the morning, and a number was contributed by the mixed quartette, Mrs. W. Drury, Miss R. Smith, J. N. Gibson and Charles Tupper. William Drury, chairman of the financial committee of the church made a statement regarding that aspect of its standing. A good special offering was placed on the tables.

The kernel of Mr. Edwards' sermon

in the morning was a plea for the building up of moral character in the individual life. To this end he indulged in a thoughtful review of the trials of Job, deprived as he was of his property, bereaved of his children, and personally physically afflicted. This, in Job's case, as in many others, was due because of sin in others, not so much in himself.

Summing up, Mr. Edwards declared that man and woman should never lose sight of the fact of "son of a devil." The Bible teaches this as much as it does that there is a personal God. Again, he pointed out, and qualified, that unrighteousness of life and conduct that will absolutely free us from trials and troubles. For we need the storm as well as the calm in the building up of moral character, the day of adversity as well as the day of prosperity. There is, said he, no purity of motive or uprightness of life that will absolutely free us from suspicion. You can never judge from the morning what the noon-day will bring forth, and from the noon-day what will materialize with the even. The preacher concluded with a warning against the "great damning sin of unbelief," which is so detrimental to the fostering of moral character. The text was the words of counsel to Job: "Acquaint now thyself with Him, and be at peace; thereby good shall come unto thee." (Job xxii. 21).

ALD. HARRISON DOES NOT OWN PART OF LAND

That the City Council Proposes to Purchase Near the Junction For Industrial Sites.

Kingston, Feb. 23.—(To the Editor): I am told that some people have the impression that Ald. Harrison, chairman of the City Property committee, has some interest in a portion of the tract of factory sites lately purchased by the corporation from Prof. Gill. In justice to Mr. Harrison it is only fair to state that during his absence from the city about a year ago I purchased from his son the land he owned at the junction, so that he has now no connection whatever with that portion. Later on Prof. Gill took an option from me, which is included in the larger area sold to the city.

It has been stated in the press that this tract purchased lies outside the city. This is not quite correct, as the portion of it referred to above is within the city and doubtless the boundaries will be extended as soon as possible to embrace the whole section.

This year's Property committee is to be commended for its energy and business acumen in securing this acreage, for not only are there no factory sites in the central areas of the city except very small individual blocks; and these are not and cannot be served by railway sidings, as the tract just purchased can be; but it is going to advertise Kingston as having taken a decided step in the direction of progress and will help those working for its advancement in locating industries.

These sites secured, it now remains to find cheap power, and the growth of the city will be assured as well as the welfare and prosperity of all the people.—Yours truly, C. A. MACPHERSON.
