## QUEEN'S CONSIDERING

### CHALLENGING FOR THE ALLAN HOCKEY CUP

Referee Brouse Reports That Friday Night's Game Resulted 4 to 3 in Queen's Favor.

It is stated that Queen's, the champions of the senior Intercollegiate Hockey Union series will aspire to higher honors and go after the Allan cup, significant of the amateur championship of the dominion. The Whig consulted an official of the club on Monday morning, who stated that nothing would be definitely decided regarding this until after Friday night's game here with Varsity.

Dr. J. J. Harty, who coached the champion collegians this season, is certainly well satisfied with the honors which the team has attained. Queen's, in its first two fixtures, got a good grip on the silverware by winning both games on its opponents' ice. Friday night, when the University of Toronto seven drifted into town for the closing scheduled game of the season, the tri-color has a chance of doubly winning the pennant. Queen's is confident of a victory over Varsity, which would mean four wins and no losses for "Jack's" team. However, in two exhibition games Queen's were defeated, but on each occasion individual members of the team were not in good shape. An order has been issued that the hockey team should attend the college days of this week. The coach wants them to retain their heat for Friday night, for a win then will make a grand clean-up. All the scores in the senior series, with the exception of when Varsity defeated McGill in Toronto by 5 to 0, have been close. The Toronto and Montreal students have each lost on each other's ice. Queen's team has received congratulations from all quarters over the winning of the championship, which the boys have consistently worked for. With the exception of Quigley, the quarterback of the rugby team, who played the right defence position, the students have all played together before. "Billie" Dobson, who was out of college for a couple of years, and returned this fall, was a tower of strength to the wing line, and with Box at centre, "Len" Smith, the rover, with McKinnon, (captain), on left wing, constituted a forward line of speed and brains. All season "Wally" Smith, playing defence, with Quigley, and "Rae" Smith, the goal tend, played splendid hockey. Rodden, Ralft, Rappell and Whyte, the spare men, were valuable.

Arthur Brouse, of the Frontenacs, who officiated on Friday night at the game here between Queen's and McGill here on Saturday afternoon sent in his report of four goals to three in favor of Queen's in the intercollegiate hockey union. This settles any possibility of McGill being allowed the goal which was scored ten seconds after full time had been rung, but not heard by the referee or all of the players, with the result that the play proceeded. J. Kennedy, of Montreal, was timing for McGill, declared after the game that James Bews, Queen's timer, had sounded the bell fifteen seconds before time was up. This resulted in a dispute, McGill holding that the score was a tie, 4 to 4. "Bouncer" Brouse did not announce the score until Saturday afternoon. A tie in the Intercollegiate had to be played off. However, on second consideration, McGill left the matter with the referee.

**Frontenacs at Orillia**  
 The junior Frontenacs left on the noon train, Sunday, for Orillia, where they play the first of the home-and-home games in the semi-finals of the junior O.H.A. on Monday evening. The boys are very confident of victory. The return game will be played in Kingston on Thursday evening, at the covered rink.

**SAILOR'S MISSIONARY**  
 Spoke in Chalmers' Church on Sunday Morning

At the Sunday morning service of Chalmers' Presbyterian church, the congregation was addressed by George D. Pound of the Sailor's Mission, upon "The Story of the Great Disaster of the Deep." The speaker gave a vivid account of his work among the sailors, and the terrible experiences through which many of them have to pass.

The speaker had many pitiable stories to relate which are from time to time to be met with on the travels of these missionaries to the sailors. Leaving our own port of Kingston there are ships which have all nationalities working upon them. If a person would take time to consider, he or she will readily see the importance of maintaining a society such as the "Sailor's Rest," or "Saug Harbor," which Kingston has. A place of this sort in many instances extends a helping hand, and instead of these sailors frequenting bars and other places of ill-repute they will find their way here and derive much benefit, both in religious and literary ways.

Mr. Pound stated that a movement was now on foot to have a banking department in connection with these institutions where the sailors may deposit their money and draw it out as they may desire. This would be a good scheme and would be a long step in eliminating drunkenness among the sailors.

The missionary spoke about the terrific storm which swept the Lakes last November. He had some thrilling cases to relate about some of the boats that had escaped. To the poor unfortunate who had perished, he paid a tribute as there were some fine converts among them.

### RE-OPENING OF CHURCH

The Wolfe Island Methodist Edifice Renovated

The Methodist church, Wolfe Island, was re-opened for public worship on Sabbath, Feb. 22nd, after being in the hands of the painters and decorators for three weeks. Rev. G. I. Campbell, B.D., of Kingston was the preacher at the morning service, and Rev. John Webster, also of Kingston, in the evening. Stewart, announced that the entire cost of about \$235 had been provided for. Both pastor and people were well pleased with the results which crowned their efforts.

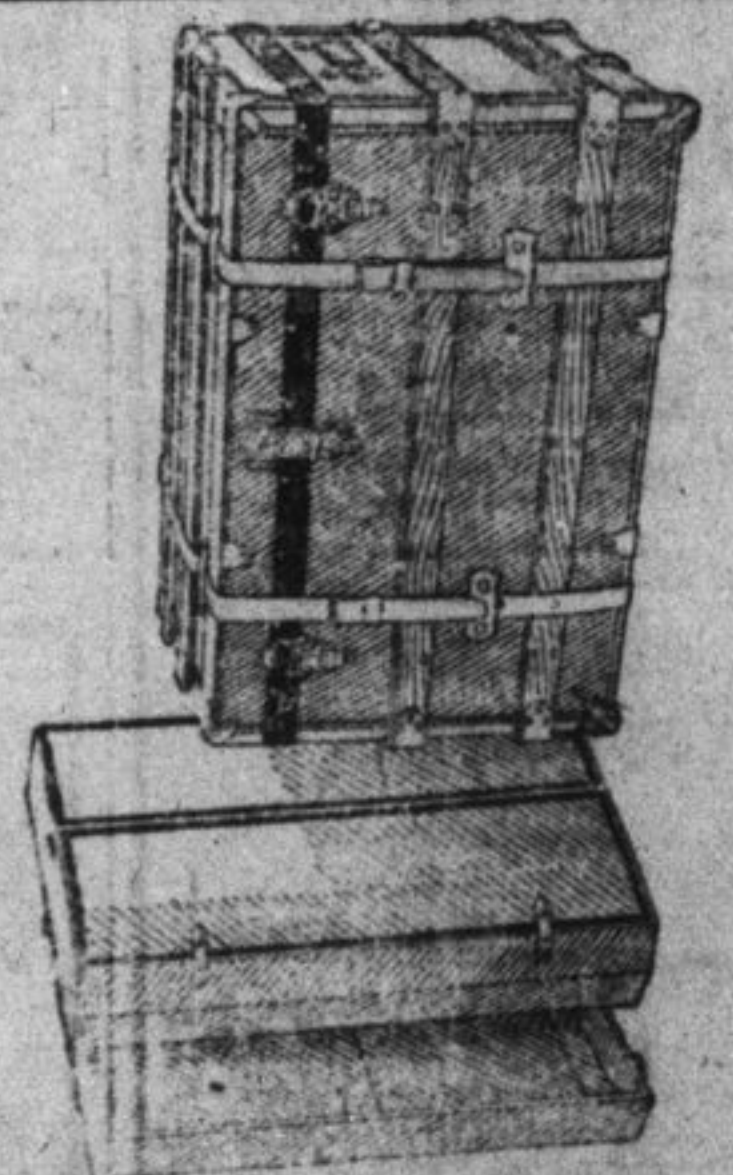
