I am a resident living one mile from Bethel in the north part of the township of Portland. I am a ratepayer and land owner. I have 150 acres on which I have to pay taxes but only fifty-nine acres in under pasture crops, the remainder is flooded the year around. My taxes last year were \$28 and I expect this year they will exceed that. If the land owners and ratepayers would get up a petition and get signers with the township's consent I will take the job of starting or getting it. If we can league together the dam will certainly have to be removed.
