K. C. I. DEFEATED QUEEN'S III, BY 7 TO 2.

And Took the Round By 15 to 5. They Will Meet Varsity III. In the Finals for the Junior Championship.

The Kingston Collegiate Institute hockey team is now qualified to meet Varsity III in the finals for the junior intercollegiate silverware, having defeated Queen's III on Friday evening by a score of 7 to 2.

The members of the team and officers are deserving of great credit for the excellent showing made during the season.

Every man on the Collegiate team played a great game on Friday evening. The defence worked well, considering the heavy ice.

During the first half the K. C. I. boys were kept on the run. When the going ran after thirty minutes play the score was tied, 2-2.

The second half was all K. C. I., Queen's being unable to get in on the goal. H. Toland scored after ten seconds play.

Frontenac's Financial Loss. Had it not been for the blow which the O.H.A. sub-committee handed out to the Junior Frontenacs, when it cancelled the certificate of Expert Millan, the captain of the team, the Frontenac management would have been able to report one of the most successful financial seasons in the history of the club.

The withdrawal of the Frontenacs from the O.H.A. meant a great financial loss. The expense of taking the team as far as Toronto amounted to about \$175.

The cancelling of the Frontenac-Oshawa game in Kingston on Thursday last, meant the loss of about \$200, which would have been the team's share of the gate receipts.

An interesting lecture on vegetable growing was delivered in the police court room on Friday evening by S. C. Johnston, the government expert demonstrator for the province of Ontario.

Mr. Johnston spoke and used lantern slides which added considerably in impressing the importance of this subject upon the good turn-out of gardeners and farmers who assembled.

Mr. Johnston, who has travelled over the greater portion of America, summed up the various methods of vegetable production. His slides showed farm after farm and the species of vegetables.

The lecturer dwelt upon the different methods of irrigation and other important points.
