LECTURE TO GARDENERS

By S. C. Johnson, the Ontario Dem-

An interesting lecture on vegetable growing was delivered in the police court room on Friday evening by S C. Johnston, the government expert demonstrator for the province of Ontario. For a good hour and a half Mr. Johnston spoke and used lantern slides which added considerably in impressing the importance of this subject upon the good turn-out of gardeners and farmers who assembled. R. J. Bushell, president of the society, remarked upon the exceptionally good gathering of gardeners, and upon the distance which some of them came. There was one in attendance by the name of C. L. Hicks, of Moscow, twenty-three miles from here, and Mr. Bushell did not hesitate to mention the fact, as Mr. Hicks is progressive gardener of the above

easter were to be seen among several Mr. Johnston, who has travelled over the greater portion of America, summed up the various methods of vegetable production. His slides showed farm after farm and the species of vegetables. The lecturer said the Americans go in for raising on a larger scale, but the results in many cases are not so good as those obtained from Ontario methods. There is now a wonderful demand for greenhouse production of vegetables and Mr. ohnston showed several large houses of this kind throughout Canada and

The lecturer dwelt upon the different methods of irrigation and other mportant points.

Mr. Bushell asked a question pertaining to the forestalling by-law, whereby gardeners are not allowed to sell to stores before a certain hour inthe morning. The lecturer said that he bad never heard of anything of this nature on his travels and was of the opinion that Kingston was the only place where such a by-law was
