

TEACHERS ARE LAZY

IN PUBLIC SCHOOLS, DECLARES BISHOP SCOLLARD.

In Opening New Roman Catholic School at Sault Ste. Marie, He Says "Sisters" Have Concealed No God in Public School.

Sault Ste. Marie, Ont., March 3.—With imposing ceremony the Right Rev. D. J. Scollard, Roman Catholic Bishop of North Bay, opened the new St. Mary's School in Sault Ste. Marie yesterday afternoon.

Preceding the opening prayer, his lordship gave a very forceful address in the Italian Catholic church, in which he very pointedly explained that the school was a Catholic one and that it was the duty of all Catholic parents to send their children to that school and to support it to the utmost of their ability.

Bishop Scollard's address in this connection was all the more significant because of the incident which led up to the fact that their children were compelled to cross three sets of railway tracks in order to attend a separate school. The property was in the town of Steelton, and because of the alleged neglect on the part of the separate school board of Sault Ste. Marie to provide the foreign section in the west end of the Soo with two hundred Italian families last year petitioned the city council to erect a public school in their ward, declaring they would support it.

They preferred to have their children taught in the public schools. On the strength of this petition a public school was erected and is now being attended by one hundred and twelve Italian children. Immediately upon the work being started on the public school, the separate school board decided to erect a 4-roomed school on the opposite side of the tracks on the same street.

Bishop Scollard was very emphatic in his declaration that it was the duty of Catholics to take their children out of the public school and send them to the separate school. In support of his contention, he stated that the separate schools throughout Ontario would compare favorably with the public schools, the difference between the public school teachers and the sisters being that the sisters had a conscience and worked every minute of their time, while the public school teachers only thought of putting in their time as easily as possible and drawing their pay.

NEW FRENCH EXPLOSIVE

More Powerful and Cheaper Than Melinite, Says Inventor

Paris, March 3.—Eugene Turpin, the inventor of Melinite, so long used in the French army and navy, has come forward with a new explosive which he declares is not only more powerful than melinite, but is cheaper and will stand a temperature of 125 degrees F. without ignition.

The war office has already appointed a commission to experiment with the new explosive which is in the form of a grey powder—a precipitate—whose combustion may be regulated so as to be serviceable in various arms by having it compressed in masses of various shapes and sizes—cubes, spheres, cones, etc.

In an interview with a representative of the public press, the inventor would only say that it contained no nitro-cellulose, left no deposit in the bore of rifle or cannon, and could not be spontaneously exploded at less than a temperature of 632 degrees F.

While conversing with the reporter the inventor placed a pinch of the powder in a saucer and attempted to ignite it by gradually bringing a match near it. Only when the flame actually reached it was it ignited, when it burned with a bright, white light, without any smoke, and leaving just a trace of fine white powder as the result of the combustion.

Will Visit England

St. Petersburg, March 3.—An interesting bit of gossip concerning the Carwich is current in court circles. It is to the effect that the little prince is to be taken to England this summer, when he will be under the care of his great-aunt, Queen Alexandra.

CANADA'S TRADE IN CHINA

Foster's Successful Efforts Borne Out by U. S. Officials

Ottawa, March 3.—Further confirmation from the mouths of United States trade officials that the efforts of Hon. George E. Foster to develop the flour trade between Canada and China have been eminently successful is afforded by a report made by the United States consul at Hong Kong, China, to his government, a copy of which has reached here.

"It will be noted," he says, "that in line with conditions noted in previous reports from this office, the United States has this as a result of differences in quality in American flour during the past year as compared with flour generally. While it is too early to make predictions as to this year's Canadian trade, it is well to note that transportation facilities now make it possible for the products of the extensive wheat fields around Calgary to find its way into the Oriental market instead of into Europe alone. There is apparently no reason why this competition should not increase in intensity in the immediate future. On the other hand, the hope expressed in the United States that the opening of the Panama canal will enable mills within reach of the wheat supply of the great lakes transportation to enter this market are unlikely to be fulfilled."

SNOW MELTING ON MARS

Dr. Lowell Finds Canals Darkening Near North Polar Cap

Boston, March 3.—The so-called canals of Mars are now exhibiting striking seasonal developments, according to Dr. Percival Lowell, of the Flagstaff, Ariz., observatory.

In a despatch received here Dr. Lowell said: "The north polar cap of the planet is melting, and the canals are strongest and darkest near the edge of the cap."

This agrees with Dr. Lowell's theory that the melting of snow at the Martian pole produces floods that sweep southward and produce the color changes in the canals.

NO USE FOR PEERAGE

Munro-Ferguson Conditionally Accepted Gov.-Generalship

London, March 3.—The new governor-general of the Australian Commonwealth, Sir Ronald Munro-Ferguson, is said to have made it a condition of his taking the office that he will not be asked to accept a peerage. He will, therefore, be the first governor-general of any dominion to remain a commoner.

Was Dragged to Death

Burks Falls, Ont., James Totten was killed near Sprucefield. He was taking a load of bark to the railway station when his team took fright and ran away, upsetting the load on the unfortunate man. He was dragged some distance and his life crushed out. Mr. Totten was a married man with a family.

One of the portraits of him at Squier's court, that by James Green, is in the dining room. His favorite hounds were two, Glory and Beauty; the picture shows him with but one, and it is supposed to be the latter. 'My Beauty hath departed,' but my 'Glory remains'."—London Chronicle.

Explosive Diamonds.

A curious fact about diamonds is that it is not uncommon for the crystals to explode as soon as they are brought up from the mines. Sometimes they have burst in the pockets or the warm hands of miners, due to the effect of increased temperature. Large stones are more likely to do this than small ones. Valuable stones have been destroyed in this way. The safeguard that some dealers place large diamonds in raw potatoes for safe transport from South Africa.

India's Liquor Bill.

The total value of liquors imported into India during the official year 1912-13 (excluding methylated and perfumed spirit and spirit present in drugs) amounted in value to \$6,972,000, a gain of \$569,000 over the preceding year.

RARE ANIMALS.

A Multitude of Wonders Are Assembled in the London Zoo.

Never has London, Eng., seen such a unique, interesting, and fascinating show as that which has been installed under the spacious roof of the Olympia, at South Kensington, by the two enterprising sons of the late Mr. Carl Hagenback, the famous dealer in wild beasts.

Altogether, some 2,000 living creatures have taken up their abode in this great house of amusement. There are no fewer than twenty full-grown lions, fifteen tigers, ten leopards, thirty-eight Polar bears, over 300 monkeys of various species, 500 birds, 100 flamingoes, twenty-five cranes, ten pelicans, twenty large serpents, including a python 28 feet long, said to be the longest in captivity, 100 snakes of various kinds, deer and antelope by the score, ten zebras, six ostriches, fifteen elephants, four hippopotami, and a host of other creatures gathered from every quarter of the globe.

Indeed, the animal alone, exclusive of the principal performing groups, are valued at \$250,000, and have been actually insured for \$185,000. The transportation of these creatures from Hamburg, which is only twenty odd hours' journey from London, cost \$5,000. They were brought over in 180 specially-designed travelling cages, attended, en route, by over a score of keepers. Every week the food bill at Olympia amounts to nearly \$1,500. Before the doors were thrown open on Boxing Day the promoters had spent \$100,000 on the show.

Among the animals there are some exceedingly rare species, creatures which cannot even be seen in the Zoological Gardens. There are three specimens of the seal elephant from the Antarctic regions, an animal that is almost extinct. Full grown this creature measures 25 feet in length, has a girth of 15 feet, and weighs more than an ordinary elephant. They are valued at \$7,500 apiece. There is also a specimen of the pigmy hippopotamus from Liberia, which could not be purchased under a check for \$5,000. It was obtained some eighteen months ago with four others from the interior of Liberia by a daring hunter. To secure these coveted specimens of the African fauna the tripper had to declare war against one of the native kings, who refused to allow him to bring the animals out of his territory.

One of the principal features of the exhibition is the display of wild life in natural surroundings without iron bars or cages obstructing the spectator's view. It is a model in miniature of Hagenback's famous Zoo in Hamburg, where wild beasts are shown in dens and caves, confined to their respective quarters by ditches and other cunningly-concealed devices. Almost in the centre of the great building a huge circus has been erected capable of seating 5,000 persons, and here, twice a day, performing animals appear. There is a group of twenty performing Polar bears, interested in that they were named and trained by the late Carl Hagenback in the hope that it would induce Captain Amundsen to use these animals for dragging the sleds in his Polar expeditions instead of dogs.

CONGREGATION APPLAUDED

Could Not Restrain Feelings Regarding Mr. Rowell

Toronto Globe. A most remarkable demonstration took place at the Sunday morning service at Howard Park Methodist church, when Rev. E. R. Lancelotti, the pastor, made a reference to the Ewart letter incident, which caused a flurry in the legislature last week.

The name of N. W. Rowell, K.C., M.P.P., electrified the congregation to such a degree that spontaneous applause resounded throughout the auditorium.

"My father was a Tory, my grandfather was a Tory, my brother was a Tory, every brother-in-law I have is a Tory, and I was reared in a Tory cradle," declared the pastor. "Yet I say that Mr. Rowell will die in his tracks and his blood will be upon us unless we Christian people get behind him and support him in his courageous stand for righteousness."

"The leader of the opposition in the provincial parliament is bearing a very grievous burden, which Christian people are augmenting by their indifference, party prejudice and cold criticism."

Referring to the action of the opposition in barring one of their members from the caucus, Rev. Mr. Lancelotti said: "This individual, by his actions, not only failed to do right, but lent himself to forces, acknowledged to be most antagonistic to all apostles of righteousness and most detrimental to the weal of the people."

After the service a large number of members surrounded the pastor and offered their congratulations for his outspoken remarks, which, they declared, had raised them to a point of unrestrained enthusiasm.

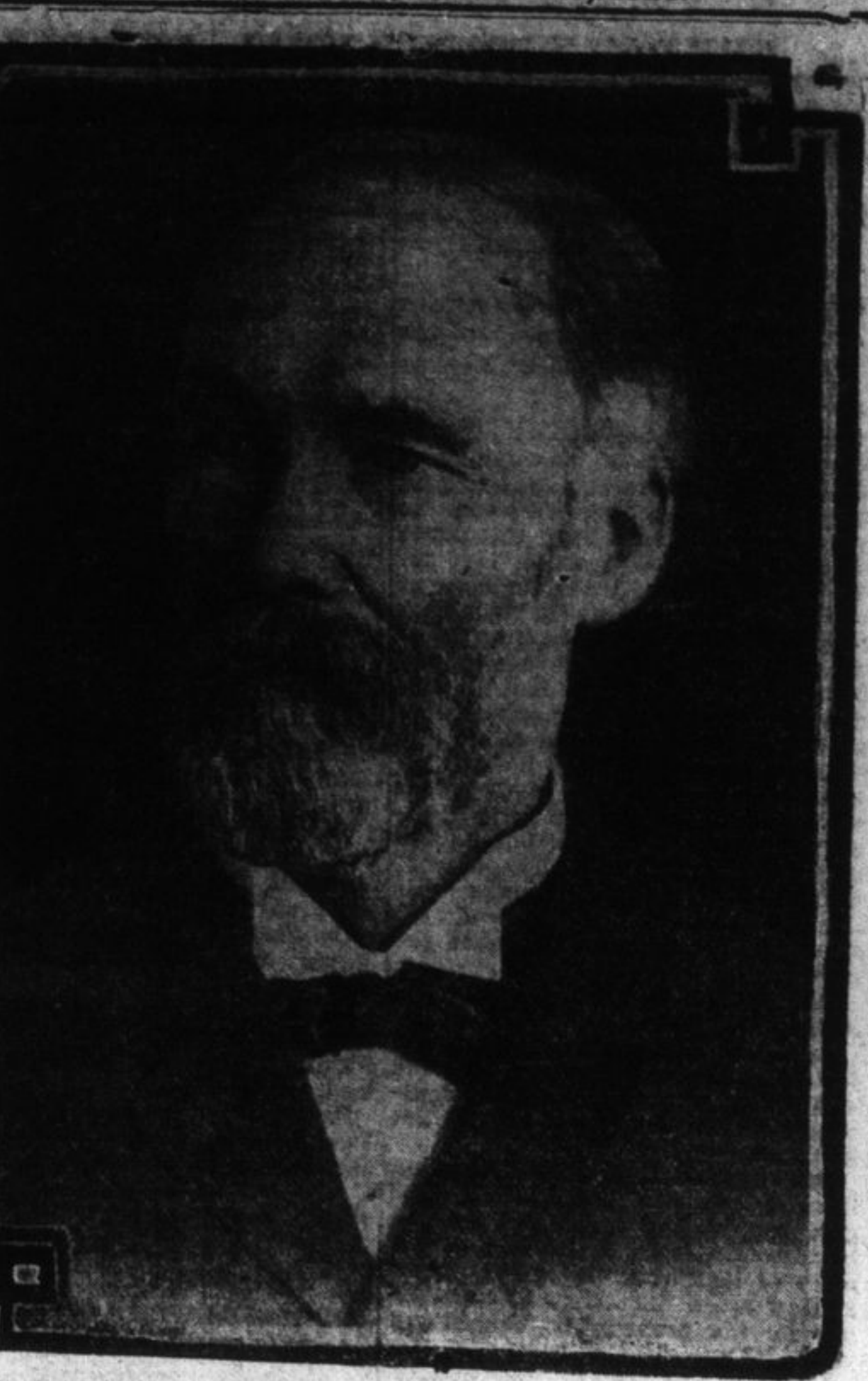

It was found to be a sparrow's nest containing the feathers and skeleton of a dead bird and four eggs. The egg-shells were exceedingly well preserved, but in the attempt to extricate them some were broken, and it was found that their contents had been entirely absorbed.

It is assumed that the bird built its nest in the hollow of the tree and died while sitting on the eggs, the hole becoming sealed up as the tree grew. The nest had probably been built a century ago, the tree being over a hundred years old.

ONTARIO GOING "DRY"

FIFTY-FIVE P. C. OF MUNICIPALITIES WITHOUT LICENSE

Total Number Licenses 1291—Decrease for the Year Was \$875,075—Convictions for Drunkenness 104 the Year 8,365.

Toronto, March 3.—While the liberal policy of "abolish the bar" is agitating the minds of the legislators in Queen's Park, the report of the liquor license branch of the provincial secretary's department, just issued, presents some interesting statistics of the movement to reduce the number of bars in the province.

The report notes at the outset that for the license year ended April 30th, 1913, there was a reduction in tavern and shop licenses of 79, and a further reduction of 88 for the year 1913-1914. The total number of all licenses for 1913-1914 is 1,799. In this respect it is significant to observe the reduction in the number of licenses since 1874, the first year for which statistics are given, to the present time. In 1874 the total licenses of all classes issued was 6,185, while in 1913 it was 1,774. These figures do not include licenses issued for six months at summer resorts and similar places, hence the slight difference in the two figures quoted.

The fines collected amounted to \$37,453, of which \$14,764 was from local option municipalities. The expenditures for the services which include the work of the license inspectors charged with the enforcement of the act, was \$31,100.

For the year there was an increase of 1,750 in the number of commitments for drunkenness over 1912, the figures in each case being 8,363 and 6,613. There were 353 convictions against local option by-laws for the year, and 761 convictions for infractions of the liquor license act exclusive of those against the local option by-laws.

There were 842 organized municipalities in the province at the time of making the report, and of these 330 are under local option. In addition there are 162 other municipalities in which no licenses are issued, leaving 350 under license. Thus it will be seen that more than half the municipalities in Ontario are without licensed hotels.

The amount paid for expenses of commissioners, salaries of inspectors, legal expenses and other incidentals was \$98,393. The total receipts for licenses, fines and transfers was \$259,075, which was distributed as follows: To the municipalities, \$339,459; to the province, \$341,977; expenses as given, \$98,393, leaving a balance of \$6,406 in the account.

DISAPPROVED CONDUCT

Was Too Fatherly in Dealing With Girls

Ithaca, N. Y., March 3.—A report reached here that the judges appointed by a committee of the National Association of Junior Republics, to investigate charges that William R. George was guilty of improper conduct toward several girl citizens of the George Junior Republic at Freeville, N. Y., have rendered a decision acquitting him, but disapproving the parental attitude he assumed as head of the institution.

The judges are Joseph J. Choate, Supreme Court Justice Samuel Seabury of New York, and Miss Lillian Wald, a social worker.

World's Supply of Lacrosse Sticks

Cornwall, Ont., March 3.—G. Russell Taggart, American consul at Cornwall, has sent a report to his government, of which the following is a summary:

"The only lacrosse stick factory in the world is located at Cornwall, Ontario. The game originated in this region, and the Indians have special skill in whittling the handles of the sticks. The factory employs ten Indians besides several white men. Three-fourths of the product is consumed in Canada, the rest going to the United Kingdom, Australia, and New Zealand, except one per cent, which is sent to the United States, principally to the Carlisle Indian school and Ithaca, N. Y. About \$2,000 worth of hickory wood, of which the sticks are made, is annually imported from the United States, while the gut comes from England."
