### SUSPICIOUS PRESENCE HUNDREDS ARRESTED

OF PROVINCIAL LICENSE INSPECTOR SNIDER WHEN THEY MARCHED IN ON CHURCH SERVICE

In Counties of Peel, Huron and Welland Before the Scott Act Votes Were Taken.

Toronto, March 4.—It does not require a man with as much prophetic insight of the future as the recently unearthed Toronto prodigy displays memory of the past, to predict that the name of Snider will figure prominently in this year's legislative debates.

The answers given by Hon. W. J. Hanna, after considerable delay, to a series of questions asked by the opposition in regard to the movements of W. K. Snider, provincial license inspector, in the week preceding the recent Scott act votes, have within themselves the germs of a good sized disturbance and fire-works will probably soon be shooting across the legislative sky.

The story, as revealed so far by the government's own answers, runs something like this. W. K. Snider, from 1906 to the end of 1908, was a provincial organizer for the conservative party. The general elections came in the year 1908. On December 31st in that year a new office was created and the conservative organizer became a provincial license inspector.

On January 29th, 1914, votes under the Scott act were taken in the counties of Peel, Huron and Welland. The government's answers show Snider's movements as follows: January 23rd, Brampton (Peel county); January 23rd, 24th and 25th, Wingham, Clinton, Goderich (Huron county); January 26th and 27th, Ridgway, Stevensville and Welland (Welland county).

It has been known before that Snider was in Huron and Welland just before the Scott act vote. This is the first intimation that he was also in the third county, Peel.

It will be remembered that, at the time, it was reported in the newspapers that this man Snider was in Welland, and that he was telling conservatives not to vote in favor of the Scott act and that the passing of legislation under such an act would embarrass the government. At first the government declared that it could not have been Snider who was there and that he must have been impersonated. As the newspaper clamor continued, however, and as prominent conservatives in Welland were protesting at Snider's mission, Mr. Hanna issued a statement saying that the provincial license inspector had been in Welland, but that anything he had done there must have been done without the authority of the government.

In the meantime it has been shown that this government official made a complete round of the three counties within a week of the election.

Mershon; solos by Miss Freda Miller, Miss Winifred Woolgar, Jean Godwin and Miss Haffner; choruses by the primary department, directed by Allan and Frederick Haffner; a cradle song by four little girls; recitations by Miss Helen Kennedy, Miss Edna Tremmer, and Earl Bruce.

**DUKE AGAIN GRAND MASTER**

London, March 5.—The Duke of Connaught was last night re-elected grand master to the United Grand Lodge of English Freemasons. The lord mayor of London, who proposed the notion, paid a handsome tribute to his royal highness for the interest he had always taken in masonry and for his distinguished services to the army and the empire.

**Rev. H. I. Horsey Delayed**  
Rev. H. I. Horsey, pastor of Welcome Zion Congregational church, who officiated at the First Congregational church, Kingston, last Sunday, did not succeed in reaching home until about six o'clock Tuesday evening. Mr. Horsey was expected last Monday evening, but owing to the severe storm of last Sunday was unable to leave Kingston, as the C. P. R. train service between that city and Ottawa was suspended. He reached home just in time to celebrate a wedding at Welcome Zion church.

New York Detectives Lock Doors and Seize L.W.W. Demonstrators — Lenton Worshippers Terrified by Uproar in Sacred Edifice.

New York, March 5.—Several hundred men who, under the leadership of the Industrial Workers of the World have been marching on church edifices recently, were arrested last night in St. Alphonsus Roman Catholic church on West Broadway, after they had disregarded warnings that if they entered the church it would be under peril of arrest.

As the men neared the church, detectives informed Frank Tannenbaum, who has headed the demonstrations during the last few days, that if the men entered the building they would do so at their peril. Tannenbaum, instead of heeding the advice, called on the men to follow him.

A Lenten service was in progress in the church when the men marched in. Women screamed when they saw the intruders, who, paying little attention to this, quickly occupied seats well in front. When the last of the men had entered the church the detectives ordered the doors locked.

Meanwhile the reserves from nearby police stations had been called out and patrol wagons from all over the city were rushing to the scene.

When the policemen entered, the church building pandemonium ensued. For half an hour there was the wildest disorder, due in a measure to the efforts of the police to separate the intruders from the worshippers.

The men were taken from the church in twos and conveyed in patrol wagons to the nearest police stations. Later they were brought into the Domestic Relations Court for a preliminary hearing.

Tannenbaum, their leader, was charged with inciting to riot and held in \$5,000 bail for a hearing tomorrow. The other prisoners, charged with disorderly conduct, were held in \$1,000 bail for a hearing to-morrow.
