SIR GEORGE W. ROSS

A SKETCH OF HIS LONG AND HONORABLE CAREER

Born in Middlesex County in 1841— Was Teacher, Journalist and Statesman—A Monarch of Oratory

From 1890 to 1905, he was premier of Ontario. His government went down to defeat in 1905 when James P. Whitney succeeded to the premiership.

As a legislator and administrator his record was one of great merit. In 1882 he introduced a resolution in the house of commons asking for the opening of negotiations looking for the establishment of reciprocal trade between Canada and the United States.

In 1886 he served as vice-president of the British Association for the Advancement of Science. He was also president for some years of the Dominion educational association.

Of Sir George W. Ross it has been said that he was a Canadian whose patriotism was as great as his eloquence.
