Creators of Artistic Effects Entitled to Exclusive Disposition of Their Products. The National Magazine. The production of designs is the work of an artist; designs are artistic creations. Designs are seldom, if ever, duplicated by designers or artists working independently. A duplication of a design is an almost certain indication that it is a copy, and that it was copied from the original. Two artists given identically the same subject and working apart and independently will not produce duplicate results. Two photographers, given the same subject and the same camera, in the same studio, but working independently, will invariably produce results that are clearly distinguishable, one from the other, and original. The work of each will be stamped and characterized with his individuality.

CHILDREN OF CLERGYMEN NOT WICKED AS A RULE

Widespread Impression in This Regard is Not Founded Upon Facts. The Christian Herald. When a minister's son or daughter goes wrong the chronic critics and the uncharitable in spirit point to them and say, "Why do preachers' children turn out badly?" Nothing could be farther from the truth than such a notion. Ministers' children turn out well, better than any others in the community. There are exceptions, but this is the rule. This fact has been recently mentioned in a sermon by Rev. Robert Hugh Morris, preached in the Central North Broad Street Presbyterian church, of Philadelphia. Among other things Dr. Morris said: "Of the fifty-one names in the National Hall of Fame, twenty are from minister's homes: Roger Williams, Jonathan Edwards, William Ellery Channing, Emerson, Holmes, Henry Clay, Agassiz, Baneroff, Beecher, Stowe, Lowell and Phillips Brooks, being fifty times more than a proportion of Maberly's families measured up to the standard. Of our twenty-seven presidents three were ministers' sons, Arthur, Cleveland and Wilson. The wives of five were ministers' daughters: Mrs. John Adams, Mrs. Millard Fillmore, Mrs. Franklin Pierce, Mrs. Benjamin Harrison and Mrs. Woodrow Wilson."

BLACK HANDER "PEACHES."

Rebaec, in Sing Sing awaiting Execution Tells of Murders. New York, March 6.—Piero Rebaec, who is in the deathhouse at Sing Sing prison waiting to be electrocuted, made a confession, yesterday, to District Attorney Frederick E. Weeks and Sheriff William J. Doyle, of Westchester county, in which he revealed the secrets of the black hand, which has been responsible for a number of murders in the county. Rebaec confessed to the murder of Tony Marro at White Plains, for which crime he is to be put to death, and also gave facts to show he had been the hired assassin of black hand agents. He declared Marro had been the victim of a vendetta, and that if he had not joined the society and killed Marro he would have met death. It is said the name of the leader of the gang that conducted the hold-up of foreign employees on the estate of John D. Rockefeller at Pocantico Hills, who was murderously attacked because they did not contribute to the agents of the black hand band, was revealed, and a number of arrests may follow.
