**ALD. HARRISON DECIDES
TO RETAIN HIS SEAT IN THE
CITY COUNCIL**

He Feels That Something Has Been
Done Towards Starting a Clarify-
ing of the Civic Atmosphere.
Kingston, March 9.—(To the Edit-
or): Permit me, through your col-
umns, to voice my thanks for the
many expressions of appreciation and
trust given me from the press of the
city, my colleagues of the council, the
Board of Trade, the finance commit-
tee, and the public in general, coupled
as these were in each instance with
the rather urgent request that I
reconsider and withdraw my resig-
nation as tendered to council at its
recent session.

Only one answer could be given to
such an unusual and general expres-
sion of approval and confidence, and
feeling that possibly sufficient has
been done towards starting a clarify-
ing of our civic atmosphere, and
feeling also an increased sense of
obligation to the city which (despite
its one or two red streaks) I have
learned to love, my limited and
somewhat over-rated abilities will
continue in its service, though for
personal reasons, I should prefer it
otherwise.

Trusting at the same time, that
these many expressions of good-will,
etc., may not develop a cranial ex-
pansion, that would necessitate the
expense of a new hat, I remain,

HANDLED QUICKLY

A Record Mail for Sydenham Post
Office.

In consequence of the wind and
snow storm last week, which block-
ed the roads in all directions, with
snowdrifts from four to ten feet
deep, the village of Sydenham was
deprived of a mail service for three
days. Not until Wednesday morning
was it possible to despatch the large
accumulation of mails to Kingston,
and in the afternoon of the same
day, a load of mail consisting of ten
bags was received at the local post
office, which constitutes a record of
being the largest mail ever re-
ceived. Postmaster Clifton Knapp,
and his assistant attacked the
"mountain" of mail with a vim, and
in one hour and fifty minutes was
ready to distribute the papers and
letters to the hundred or more
anxious and patiently waiting pat-
rons of the office. In the evening
five more bags were brought in,
making a total of fifteen sacks in
one day.

MUST PAY ON AUTO POLICY

Mutual Insurance Company Loses
Appeal at Osgoode.
The appellate division has dismiss-
ed the appeal in the case of
Lennox & Addington Mutual Fire
Insurance company an appeal from
the county court of Frontenac in fa-
vor of the plaintiff for \$375 and costs
on an action on a fire insurance
policy on an automobile. The com-
pany set up that in the application
for insurance the automobile was de-
scribed as being in the township of
Fredericksburg on farm premises,
whereas, at the time of its destruc-
tion it had been for some weeks in
a paint shop and garage in King-
ston, and that the omission to notify
the company of the change in loca-
tion voided the policy. The appeal is
dismissed on the ground that the
policy had been amended to apply
to the automobile as long as owned
by the assured.

BOLD BOY BURGLAR

**ENTERED BOARDING HOUSE
BOOM AND STOLE JEWELRY**

Arrested at Outer Station and Had
Stolen Goods in His Possession—
His Home in Hamilton—Remand-
ed a Week.

A bold boy burglar is in the cus-
tody of the Kingston police. He is
just fifteen years of age and his home
is in Hamilton. Magistrate Parrell
remanded him for a week in order
that his record might be looked up.
The youngster arrived in Kingston
early on Sunday morning with a
companion named "Harry." The two
stayed at the outer station until a-
bout nine o'clock, and then came to
the city. The Hamilton youth then
set out to secure a boarding house.
He was accommodated at the home of
Mrs. George Buchanan, at 247 Brock
street, but left rather suddenly af-
ter having his dinner. Three rings
and a gold locket and chain, the
property of Miss Etta Buchanan, dis-
appeared about the same time. The
missing youth was suspected of hav-
ing committed the theft and the po-
lice were notified.

The police searched the city for the
lad but he could not be located. Con-
stable John Naylor went out to the
junction and there he found the boy
who was evidently waiting for a
train. When searched by Constable
Naylor he had two of the missing
rings and the gold locket and chain
in his possession, the jewellery being
tied up in his handkerchief, the boy
was then placed under arrest. The
theft occurred in the afternoon and
before 7 p.m. he was locked up at
police headquarters. He admitted his
guilt and when asked about the oth-
er ring stated that he had been
showing it to a Polander at the
outer station and that the Polander
had kept it. Thus far it has not
been located.

The jewellery was left on a bureau
in a bedroom occupied by Miss Bu-
chanan, and while Miss Buchanan
was out of the room the youngster
walked in and helped himself.
The boy had no money and stated
that he and his companion beat their
way down from Toronto during Sat-
urday night on a freight train, ar-
riving here shortly after three o'clock.
Although his home is in Hamilton he
had been in Toronto for the past
six weeks.

Rev. A. E. Smart, inspector for the
Children's Aid society, appeared in
the juvenile court with the boy,
and after hearing the evidence in the
case, it was decided by the magis-
trate to remand him for a week,
he made about him. He admitted to
the police that he had been in some
trouble in Hamilton.

RAILWAY CAR ROBBED

**THEVES BROKE OPEN THE
SEAL OF THE CAR.**

Smashed Open a Box and Made Off
With Ten Pairs of Shoes — Be-
lieved to be Organized Band of
Car Thieves at Work in the City.
Railway car thieves are at work in
Kingston. Some time during Sat-
urday night, a car belonging to the
Canadian Pacific railway which was
left on a siding near the round house,
was broken open, and as a result the
company is now minus ten pairs of
shoes which were in a box car.
The car was sealed, but this did
not prevent the thieves from getting
in their work. Once inside the car,
it was a very easy matter to break
open the box containing the shoes.
It looked as if the box had been kick-
ed open.
The car which figured in the rob-
bery was left on the siding early on
Saturday night, but the theft was
not known until Sunday morning,
when some of the officials paid a vi-
sit to the car.
There has been a great deal of
stealing from railway cars in and
around Kingston of late, and it would
appear as if the work is being car-
ried on by an organized band. Not
long ago, a car on the C. P. R. was
entered and on this occasion the
thieves made a haul of boots and
shoes. The consignment of shoes
taken Saturday night, are American
make, a number of them being the
Dorothy Dodd class.
The fact that it is a penitentiary
offence to break open a sealed car
does not appear to frighten them in-
clined to steal.

Trustees Were Found "Guilty."
On Saturday morning, the trustees
of the Sharpton school, in the town-
ship of Kingston, were found "guil-
ty" by Justice of the Peace George
Hunter, of non-payment of wages to
J. W. Reiden, the caretaker of the
school, and were forced to pay \$3.40
and cost of \$7. J. L. Whiting ap-
peared on behalf of the school trustees.
