## FROM THEIR HOME NEAR ERNESTOWN ON MONDAY

Started Out to See the World But Gave Themselves Up to Kingston Police After Suffering from Cold and Hunger.

Two boys, one aged twelve and the other thirteen, ran away from their home near Ernestown on Monday to "see the world," as they said. The boys are neighbors, and planned to go to Kingston and then head for New York and other big cities. However, Kingston was their limit, as upon their arrival here they had suffered so much from cold and hunger that they were glad to give themselves up to the police. They asked to spend the night in the police station and also asked that word be sent to their parents. They were notified and came in after the youngsters on Wednesday afternoon and took them home.

The boys came to the police station about 6 o'clock on Tuesday evening. They told about running away from their home and stated that they had walked part of the way into Kingston and secured a ride in a sleigh the other portion of the way.

"We intended running away from home," one youngster said, "but we have changed our mind and now it is best that we should return home."

Asked why they wanted to run away the boys stated that they became tired of work on the farm. One claimed that it was all work and no play, with very little time for study at school, and this was the reason he wanted to get away. He had an idea that he could earn his own living. However, after the two youngsters had been out for a few hours they were convinced that their little scheme could not be worked out satisfactorily, and that they had better give in.

One lad lives with his parents but the other is a home boy sent out from Scotland. He says his father deserted his mother and that he was sent out to this country. The little fellow is very anxious to see his mother, and thought that perhaps he could earn enough money to take him back to Scotland.

"But maybe some day I'll have enough money," he said, "and when I do I will go and visit my mother." Both lads are bright. They have been on a farm practically all their life and they expressed great

## AN OFFER TO KINGSTON OF PROPERTY AT CALABOGIE FOR POWER DEVELOPMENT

Six Thousand Horse Power Can be Developed — Boyd Caldwell Interviews Mayor Shaw and T. J. Rigney.

Boyd Caldwell, of Lanark, was in the city on Tuesday interviewing Mayor Shaw and T. J. Rigney, chairman of the Utilities commission, in relation to the sale of the falls on the Madawaska river, at Calabogie, for the generation of electric power. This matter, which mayor made note of before the commission, will likely be discussed at greater length at the next meeting of the commission.

The property which Mr. Caldwell owns and from which he states can be generated a minimum of 25,000 horse power for continuous service, has many natural advantages, with a drop of twenty-four feet. The falls are about ninety miles from Kingston. Mr. Caldwell is prepared to dispose of the property to the city.

A municipality has not the right to acquire property for such a purpose. However, the matter has been referred to the Hydro-Electric commission.

## A DISTINGUISHED HONOR

Goes to Captain Carr-Harris an R.M.C. Graduate. The Gazette, of the British army, in India, makes the announcement that Captain Carr-Harris, of the royal engineers, has been nominated by the commander-in-chief for admission to the staff college of the Indian army at Quetta.

The captain is a graduate of the Royal Military college and has been doing distinguished service in India. He has just finished the "Broken Road," a railway running from India to Afghanistan and which had cost many lives, owing to the opposition of the native tribes. Many a British officer had worked on the line, but it was Captain Harris's good fortune to complete it. He is an Ottawa boy, a son of Dale Carr-Harris. It is regarded as a high honor to secure admission to staff college as the pick of the British army secure it only as a result of a very strict competitive examination, and scores of officers who pass are not admitted owing to there being no vacancies. Nominations are made by the commander-in-chief only for distinguished service.

## MILITIA COUNCIL REPORT

Contains Some Figures With Regard to Kingston. The report of the militia council for the fiscal year ending March 31st, 1913, is to hand.

Under organization is noted that of the 34th battery, R.C.A., at Belleville, for the third division. The organization of No. 3 Detachment Canadian Ordnance corps (non-permanent) was also authorized, as well as No. 3 section Canadian Army Veterinary Corps.

During the year thirty-four officers were appointed to the several branches of the permanent staff and permanent force.

The Royal Canadian Horse Artillery number 245—seventeen officers, six warrant officers, 222 N.C.O.'s and men.

The strength of the permanent force at the station of Kingston, including non-permanent militia officers attached for duty, was: 27 officers, 10 warrant officers, 285 N.C.O.'s and men. Kingston is fourth numerically, Halifax taking the lead, with 1,071 of all ranks.

The increase in the cadets from December, 1911, was 11,050. A total of 675 staff, instructors, cadets and boys attended the 1912 cadet camp at Barriefield.

The expenditure at the Royal Military College was \$131,241, of which \$36,785 was returned in fees.

The expenditure for lands at the Petawawa camp grounds was \$13,593.
