These six boys will have the honor of wearing two Intercollegiate crests on their sweaters. The rugby crests have arrived at the school and will be given to the boys in the course of a few days.

This, Ald. Nickle said had been done by the company, and the street soon afterwards quoted to this city were decidedly lower than they otherwise would have been.

ACTION AGAINST CITY

FOR UNSTATED DAMAGES BY H. E. W. NICHOLSON

Whose Wife Lost a Portion of Her Arm by Coming in Contact With Live Electric Wire on Montreal Street.

J. I. Whiting, K.C., who is acting on behalf of H. E. W. Nicholson, of the Grand Trunk outer depot, has entered an action against the corporation of the city of Kingston for unstated damages for the loss of his wife's arm as a result of coming in contact with a live wire near the Grand Trunk outer depot on the evening of Oct. 11th, 1913.

Mr. and Mrs. Nicholson and daughter were returning home on that evening when Mrs. Nicholson came in contact with an electric wire, which was lying across the sidewalk a short distance from the station. Mr. Nicholson and his daughter also received a severe shock.

Mrs. Nicholson's hand was so severely burned that it was found necessary to amputate a portion of the arm.

Some weeks after the accident the Utilities' committee received a letter from Mr. Whiting, who was acting on behalf of Mr. Nicholson, stating that unless some settlement was made the matter would be taken to court. The committee referred the matter to the Utilities commission, which was elected in January. At a meeting of the commission held on Monday afternoon E. J. Bigney stated that the matter was being dealt with.

Unless some settlement is made the case will be heard at the fall session of the high court.
