A PROTEST IS MADE AGAINST FINDING OF THE WRECK COMMISSIONERS

Who Held Investigation in Kingston Over the Sinking of Steamer Acadia - Shipmasters' Association Will Press Matter Before Department.

The Owen Sound Times has taken up the case of Capt. Robert McIntyre, captain of the Acadia, who was censured for the stranding of the vessel, as a result of the investigation which was held in Kingston, referring to the matter the Times has a lengthy article, in which it says:

The Times has secured a copy of the finding of the commission. The only possible conclusion that can be reached is that if there is such a process as an appeal from the finding it should be put into effect at once.

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FIVE PRIESTS SLAIN And Convent Burned by Mexican Rebels.

New Orleans, March 15.—Five priests have been slain by rebels in the Mexican state of Tamaulipas since Nov. 18th, three are held for ransom, a convent has been burned and a cathedral and a smaller church looted, according to two Catholic priests, Father Jose Moreno Madina, and Father Jose Moreno Madina, who arrived here recently from Brownsville. Both said they had been driven from Victoria, Mexico.

"Three weeks ago soldiers under Colonel Cavalero demanded money," said Father Madina. "We gave them what we had, but it was not enough. Becoming angry they took away the gold and silver utensils and wrecked the inside of the building. The figure of the Saviour was smashed to bits and other statuary broken and trampled under foot."

"The archbishop, Jose Guzman, and his aged aunt, were thrown into the street by the marauders," continued Father Madina. "Father Guzman died two days later and just before we left we heard the aunt was dying. The rebels then went to the American convent, drove out the sister and her charges and set the building on fire."

At Tula a church was looted, said Father Madina, and Father De Leon and his two assistants, Basilio and Louie Romanes, were kidnapped. He said they were taken into the hills, where they are being held for ransom of 500 pesos each, their parishioners having been notified that unless the ransoms are paid the priests will be put to death. Father Madina said five priests had been killed by rebels since they entered Tamaulipas last November.

NEW STYLE OF HOUSE Each Floor Falls Back From the One Below It.

Paris, March 18.—A new style of architecture, novel and not unpleasing to the eye, has been inaugurated in the Rue Varin in a large six-story house of flats recently constructed. Each story of the house retrogrades on the one below, leaving a wide balcony or terrace in front of its windows.

The house has a distinct resemblance to a huge flight of stairs. It is argued that the hygienic advantages of such a method of construction quite compensate for the waste of space.

WEDDING RING IS BARBAROUS. Famous Suffragist Now Mrs. Bois-sevain Refuses to Wear One.

New York, March 18.—"Wedding rings are relics of barbarism," declared Mrs. Ipez Millholland Boissevain.

"They are relics of the day when women were men's chattels. I should feel like a slave instead of a free woman if I were to wear a wedding ring."

The fact that Mrs. Boissevain does not wear a wedding ring has caused a stir of curiosity among suffragists.
