## THE SPORT REVIEW

### MONTREAL A.A.A. MAY PLAY ENGLISH RUGBY

### And Drop Out of the Canadian Game—Higher Hockey Prices in Ottawa Next Winter

The Montreal Gazette says: Several of the older members of the Montreal Amateur Athletic association's rugby club have recently expressed their opinion in favor of dropping out of the Interprovincial Rugby union next season to take up the English game. The winged wheel club has not been particularly successful during the past three seasons. They did not win a single match either last season or the previous year, while in 1911 their record does not show much more success. The older members of the club believe that the time has come when they should drop out until the younger players are developed in the intermediate and junior series of the Quebec rugby union, after which they could return to senior ranks.

There has been a shortage of rugby players at the M. A. A. A. for some seasons and the outlook for next autumn is not any brighter. Last autumn a professional coach was engaged to handle the men and there was only a poor attendance at the practices.

### Not Likely to Jump

While there is no immediate likelihood of the Canadian baseball league jumping to the Federals, according to President Fitzgerald, the press throughout the circuit expresses the opinion that such a course might be advisable should the league meet with a second rebuff in its application for Class B rating.

The National association, apparently most supercilious inquiries turned the Canadian league down flatly. The claim of the league to higher classification is valid and cannot be questioned. President Fitzgerald will appeal to the National commission. The appeal is not without prospect of success. Should the Fitzgerald circuit, the most prosperous of all Class C leagues, and the superior of others which have been given B rating, be again denied that which is unquestionably its due, the Federal league affiliation will doubtless receive serious consideration by the club owners.

### Frank Moran, Optimist

Jack Johnson, who is matched with Frank Moran, for the world's heavyweight championship at the "Colonne d'Alver, Paris, on June 27th, is very optimistic about his chances of retaining the championship which Jeffries lost at Reno on July 4, 1908. Johnson is getting old and has lost much of his speed, said Moran, and judging from what he saw of Johnson at Paris a few weeks ago during the latter's bout with Battling Jim Johnson, there is nothing to the coming scrap between the black heavy and the white hope but the turning over of the title by the present holder to the "scraper" from the "Smoky City."

### Higher Hockey Prices

Hockey prices will take a jump in Ottawa next winter. Not the salaries, but the admission tax. The Ottawa club's scale was much lower than in Toronto, Montreal or Quebec this season, and the club has decided on a 50 per cent. increase all around. There will not be any "millionaire row." Instead, seats will be installed and sold ahead of time. Standing room will only be around the back of the promenades. The Ottawa announce that their scale will correspond with those now in vogue at Toronto, Montreal and Quebec.

### Intermediate Hockeyists

Arrangements were completed yesterday whereby Berlin, O.H.A. intermediate champions, and Western University, London, Northern league champions, will play at the Arena, Toronto, on Friday night. They want to decide which is the best intermediate team in Ontario. Both will run special excursions.

### May Be Real "Mill"

The Toronto Globe says: St. Michael's and Cleveland will play their return game at Cleveland on Saturday night, and the local team will leave on Friday for the United States city. St. Mike's have not been practising very much of late and will not be in the best of condition. As the game here was far from a love-feast there will no doubt be some old scores settled. St. Mike's are all ready and well able to look after themselves.

### Dog Saves Family

Boston, Mass., March 20.—Prince, a big collie owned by Michael H. Flynn, of Somerville, died in a fire after saving the Flynn family from death.

Prince was locked in the cellar and his barking awakened Mrs. Flynn. She smelled smoke coming up through the registers from the cellar and she in turn aroused her husband and children. They had time to dress hastily and make their way out of the house, but when Mrs. Flynn opened the cellar door to let Prince out, he was dead.

### Former Slave Dead

Stratford, Ont., March 20.—Wesley Porter, one of Stratford's most familiar figures died yesterday. Porter was born in slavery at Lexington, Ky., and was according to common estimation over a hundred years of age. During temporary liberty caused by his master's death, he fled to Canada. His wife who survives him, is reputed to be older than he.

## COUNT'S ASHES BY POST

### Remains of German Noble Thus Forwarded to Relatives

New Rochelle, N.Y., March 20.—The remains of a dead man were shipped yesterday from this city to Posen, Germany, by parcel post. The remains were the ashes of the late Count Gromoz Von Gowmadzinski, who died in this city on February 14th. The ashes were contained in a cylindrical-shaped box, which weighed about five pounds and was consigned to relatives in the fatherland.

Count Von Gowmadzinski came to this city about twenty years ago. He built up a small fortune in real estate speculation, but at the time of his death left comparatively little property. He lived the life of a recluse and was known intimately by comparatively few people. His particular friends were of his own nationality. At the time of his death he requested Robert Lesses to have his body cremated and the ashes sent to the family home in Germany.

The count served through the Franco-Prussian war and carried the rank of colonel in the German army.

## RUSSIAN ADMIRAL HELD

### Alleged Police Blunder Appears of Serious Import

Cologne, Germany, March 20.—The arrest of the Russian naval commander, Polakoff, during the carnival here several weeks ago, which the German press assumed was due to a police blunder, now appears of more serious import than at first thought. According to the Cologne Gazette, the testimony of three reputable witnesses before the examination judge confirmatory to the charge of theft against Commander Polakoff was so strong that the judge could not do otherwise than hold him for trial.

Commander Polakoff protested his innocence, but was unable to controvert the testimony of the witnesses.

The paper expresses the hope that the trial may show that the officer was the victim of misunderstanding and was really innocent.

## WILL BREED DEER

Trout Creek, March 20.—A. Merner, a prominent resident of this town, has imported from New Hampshire a number of live deer for breeding purposes. He has enclosed over 300 acres of bush land, which he intends to convert into a breeding place for deer, and probably buffalo, if they are obtainable. This town is on the North Branch of the Grand Trunk railway.

## Royal Divorce in Sweden

Stockholm, March 20.—Prince Wilhelm of Sweden, and Princess Marie Pavlovna of Russia, have presented the king with a petition for divorce signed by both parties. Incompatibility of temper is indicated as the ground of the application. Dr. Larson, a well-known physician, and Baron Rudebeck, one of the court chamberlains, are cited as witnesses. The application will probably be granted very soon.

## CHINESE CONSTITUTION

### Convention Opens in Peking for Its Amendment

Peking, March 20.—A convention opened here yesterday for the purpose of amending the provisional constitution of the Chinese republic. San Pao-Chi, acting premier and minister of foreign affairs, presided. Out of the sixty delegates elected forty-four were present.

San Pao-Chi delivered to the convention an inaugural address by President Yuan Shi Kai in which the president gave a sketch of the ill-effects of internal and foreign relations owing to its restrictions on the government and its unsuitability to existing conditions in China.

The president added that he felt assured the convention would result in rectifications of the constitution which would bring about peace and prosperity for China and her people.

## LONDON THEATRE TRAGEDY

### Man Shoots Himself During Performance at Empire

London, March 20.—A sensation occurred at the Empire Theatre of Varieties, Leicester Square, during the performance, when a young man named Richard Comor, shot himself in the saloon bar behind the second circle. He was taken to the hospital in a critical condition. Comor was speaking to a girl and both were drinking at a table, when suddenly he pulled out a revolver and said: "I hope this will be a lesson to you. You have driven me to this." Then he shot himself.

## Insuring Against Appendicitis

London, March 20.—A group of Lloyd's underwriters some months ago fixed a premium of ten shillings for policies of insurance against appendicitis covering all claims for expenses up to £100. There are so many claims that it is found impossible to continue on these terms. A new syndicate has been formed, however, and the premium raised to twenty shillings.

## U. S. DOES NOT WANT

### Sir Lionel Carden as Minister to Mexico

Washington, March 20.—The announcement in the House of Commons by Sir Edward Grey, minister of foreign affairs, that Sir Lionel Carden would return to Mexico City to resume his duties as British minister there, will not be pleasing to the Wilson administration. The supposition that the amicable conversation between President Wilson and Sir Lionel Carden at the White House, on March 3rd had cleared away the irritation felt by this government over Sir Lionel Carden's reported attitude in the Mexican situation has not been verified by developments since that time.

It is said that the administration would much prefer to have some other British diplomat designated as King George's minister to the Huerta government. The administration is credited with the opinion that Sir Lionel Carden's admitted ownership of property in Mexico furnishes a very good reason why he should not return to his post.

## BLOW TO TURF GAMBLERS

### Switzerland Prohibits Sweepstakes on English Racing

Geneva, Switzerland, March 20.—Public sentiment against gambling on horse-racing has extended to Switzerland and the police authorities have prohibited the drawing of the various sweepstakes on the chief horse-racing events in England. The drawing was advertised for March 21st and \$75,000 of English betters' money has been received here during the past few weeks. The action of the police is a blow to English betting on the continent.

## Former Kingston Couple Wedded

The marriage was quietly celebrated in Calgary, Alta., on Wednesday evening, at the church of St. Barnabas, Hillhurst, of Hilda Ida MacAston, third daughter of Mr. and Mrs. George Acton, York street, and Charles Phillips, both of Calgary, Alta., but formerly of this city. Rev. Mr. Montgomery officiated. The bride was given away by her brother-in-law, Bert Wood. After the honeymoon dinner was served at the home of Mr. and Mrs. B. Wood, Centre avenue, Hillhurst. Covers were laid for twenty-four. Mr. and Mrs. Phillips will reside in Calgary.

## Parted Over Kisses

New York, March 20.—Ernest Cornell, of North Broadway, Yonkers, whose bride Matilda, brought him before police court because he never kisses her, was shown the error of his ways yesterday. He promised to do better.

Domestic Relations Officer Matilda Lesnick, after a heart-to-heart talk, succeeded in patching up the shattered romance. He told Cornell his mistakes had broken a great many hearts and pocket-books and advised him to be more devoted to his wife. Cornell finally agreed with him and the couple made up.

## Rowing at Brockville

Brockville, March 20.—The B. R. C. intend taking up rowing on an extensive scale this summer. The executive has placed an order with Toronto maker for two fours and two singles, which will be delivered early in the spring.

## IMPORTANT JUDGMENT

### Employees of Company Get \$10,500 Against Bank Taking Business

Vancouver, B.C., March 20.—Justice Macdonald, in a written decision, gave judgment to the eighty-five employees of the Imperial Timber and Trading company for \$10,500 and costs against the Royal bank. The amount claimed represented the men's wages for November and December, 1913, up till the time the bank took possession of the property of the company as security for advances.

The action was of particular interest to the legal fraternity, as being the first action brought in Canada under the new amendment to section 88 of the bank act, making any bank liable for wage claims where it takes possession of a business. His lordship found that the judgment of the men had previously obtained against the Imperial Timber and Trading company was not a bar to obtaining judgment against the bank.
