The will of George Westinghouse, who died in New York last week, was filed for probate. No estimate of the value of the estate is made, but it is said to be about \$35,000,000. TO STUDY COLONIAL SCHEME

French Deputy Struck With British Management in India. Paris, France, March 28.—M. Bluyssen, deputy for the French Indian dependencies, travelling recently in India was impressed by the good-will and interest manifested by the British authorities, especially by Lord Hardinge, in Pondicherry and the other French dependencies. The history of Pondicherry during the eighteenth century is one of constant warfare between the French and English. Taken by the English under Gen. Eyre Coote in 1761, it was restored to France in 1765 and again taken by Sir Hector Munro in 1775. In 1785 it was handed back to the French and taken for the third time by the British under Col. Braithwaite in 1793. The final restoration to France took place in 1816. M. Bluyssen, whose opinion as to the extension of the entente cordiale to India has been called to the Monitor, considers that the co-operation between the spirit of good-will and friendship which exists between England and France to bear upon the problems and difficulties which exercise the French authorities in India. The formation of Pondicherry, for instance, divided as it is into some by strips and enclaves of British territory, and hampered by the existence of a customs tariff, leaves very much to be desired when the interests of French trade come to be considered. At the present time, a difficulty threatens which co-operation between French and British authorities could probably circumvent. A water reservoir is shortly to be constructed in Mysore territory which will interfere with the water supply of Karikal and Tanjore.

MINISTERS APPLAUD ATTACK

Baseball Evangelist Comes in for Red Hot Criticism. New York, March 20.—Red hot criticism of Evangelist Billy Sunday and his methods as "expensive, ineffectual and undignified" was current among Methodist pastors here as the result of a meeting of the Methodist ministers of Manhattan, Brooklyn and the Jersey conference in which the attacks on Sunday became so bitter that finally the doors were closed. "If you criticize Sunday he tells you to go to hell," said the Rev. E. S. Piper, of Pittsburgh, who also asserted that Sunday "abused the Protestant churches with crutches of kind of billingsgate, but never once said aught against the Roman Catholic church." More than 300 ministers were present at the meeting and most of them loudly applauded the attacks on Sunday. The Rev. Mr. Piper said the expense of Sunday's recent Pittsburgh revival was \$90,000 and its returns 141 alleged converts, showed that \$260 each was the cost. Particularly were the New York ministers against at Sunday's reported demand that the churches close up during a planned campaign here. Former Superintendent Chadwick, of the local conference, said: "Are we ready to get down on our knees to Sunday? Do we want to close up ninety-six of our churches that Sunday may manage them? Shall our Protestant churches in New York go out of business for a month that Sunday may have something to do?" The general impression of the conference was that they would not.
