Introduced to Amend Indian

Ottawa, March 21.-An act to amend the Indian act was introduced by Hon. Dr. Roche in the commons. One amendment deals with industrial schools and provides that where there are no industrial schools the minis-ter may declare a public school to be an industrial school under the meaning of the act. Another amendment regulates the procedure after the expropriation of sites for such schools, and a third extends the existing provisions of the law for the resumption of control over Indian reserves. fourth amendment prohibits the attendance of Indians at dances or stampedes outside of their own re-




