The Stranger At Church

The Stranger's first acquaintance with Cooke's Presbyterian church was in the days of Rev. Andrew Wilson, who did not appear to agree with the 150th psalm of David, which called upon the people to praise their Creator with all kinds of musical instruments—trumpets, symbols, brass organs. This Cooke's minister would have neither organ-playing nor hymn-singing in his church. The psalms of David were sung, but not the 150th. Cooke's was not disturbed by the blasts of a pipe organ until the Rev. Samuel Houston, a very learned man, whom The Stranger liked to hear in the pulpit, had served more than half his pastorate with the Brook street Presbyterians.

It seems that some of the old lovers of Calvin had been "chased" out of Chalmers church, which installed a large organ as early as 1875; at least these worshippers fled themselves from a house of prayer which was being "desecrated" by music from pipes. They found refuge in Cooke's where the preacher and his tuning fork still held the fort. Then the younger generation of Cooke's finally gained the upper hand and installed a small pipe organ. The "higher critic" who would expunge the 150th psalm from the bible, was "up against it," but had to "face the music," or rather set up another church of their own, just as Chalmers and Cooke's people did when they seceded from the auld kirk on Princess street.

The three last ministers of Cooke's, an Irish established congregation, have been all of Scottish name and descent. In the present pastor, the Rev. James MacIntosh, The Stranger thinks this congregation has an ideal pastor as well as a solid preacher. It is a great thing to have the qualities of both pastor and preacher, and Mr. MacIntosh possesses them to a remarkable degree. The Stranger might remark that he is worth more than Cooke's is paying him, and some other congregation is liable to steal him away any time.

Some of the old faces that The Stranger saw in Cooke's thirty or more years ago, then jeocularly called the "Armagh schoolhouse," are no longer there, for he noticed some of them worshipping in other Presbyterian churches to which they have become attached. With some of these back, the congregation of Cooke's would profit at least financially.

However, notwithstanding, Cooke's has no debt. Few churches can boast of this. The Stranger recalls the night when the Rev. Samuel Houston, whose mortal remains lie buried with kindred dust in an Irish graveyard, burned the mortgage which stood against the edifice, and rang the long-bellied belfry. With a clean sheet, Cooke's should be a good mission giver.

Cooke's for years has been very active in young people's work, for there was energy in its leaders. There is life in all its departments and the warmth of hospitality among its people.

AIRMEN MAKING FORTUNES

Hamel Takes Passengers Loop-Looping at \$250 Each

London, March 21.—Airmen who are taking passengers for flight are in the way of making speedy fortunes. Gustav Hamel, who regularly loops-the-loop with a passenger at a fee of \$250, is possibly the most prosperous. Yesterday he looped-the-loop nearly forty times during the afternoon, taking four passengers, including two men.

Milberto in England only women have ventured loopin'-the-loop as passengers. Three of Hamel's passengers were Prince Paul of Serbia, Miss Trehawke Davies and Mrs. Hart Davies. One of the male passengers carried up with him two little black pigs. The present recognized charge for cross-country flying is \$2.75 a mile for return journeys and five dollars a mile for single outward journeys. The airman can travel with ease over a mile a minute and under favorable conditions on a cross-country journey can earn \$350 in sixty minutes. At the Handon aerodrome an average of sixty passengers are taken up on a fine Sunday afternoon.

BUG ON HER EAR AS FAD

Miss Gladys Hinckley Gives Another Thrill to Fashionables

Washington, March 21.—Miss Gladys Hinckley, with a liking for the eccentric and unusual, is giving Washington society another thrill. Two years ago she started her friends by appearing among the fashionable promenaders on Connecticut avenue wearing about her neck a roakistic golden snake. Now she is wearing a tiny jewelled bug.

It hangs from Miss Hinckley's right ear by an almost invisible chain. Her friends call it exceedingly "cute." It is a tiny platinum affair, and the young woman, who is twenty, hopes it will start a fad.

Miss Hinckley is the daughter of the former Miss Nora O'Donnell, of Baltimore. She is once called "the most beautiful girl in America" by the Russian ambassador. She is writing a book of her experiences and impressions, under the title, "My Experiences in Society." She will talk of the bug, but not the book.

FIRE TUG FOR G. C. BOLDT

Will Have 40 H. P. Motor and 300 Feet of Hose.

Alexandria Bay, March 21.—A new fire tug for George C. Boldt is now under construction at his yacht house on Wellesley Island. The hull is fifty-eight feet over all with ten feet beam, and is made of wood.

A forty-horse power Buffalo heavy duty engine will be installed to propel her, and a three-inch Humber fire pump will be attached to the forward end of the motor. A low deck house will be built over the engine, with a hose reel carrying about 300 feet of hose. The steering wheel and clutch of the engine to the fire pump will be on deck, so that it will be controlled by the captain. Besides using as a fire tug, it will be used to haul scows and do other similar work on the water around the property of Mr. Boldt. The tug was designed and is being built under the supervision of Capt. Fred Adams, the builder of A. G. Miles' new racing hydroplane.

NAVY LEAGUE GRIEVANCE

Not Satisfied With Outlay of £51,000,000

London, March 21.—The Navy League has expressed its dissatisfaction at the proposals of the admiralty regarding the new construction programme outlined in the first lord's statement in the commons. Since the failure of Canadian aid the league has persistently urged the laying down of three ships to fill the gap caused by Canada's failure to contribute towards the imperial fleet. The government's scheme to fill the gap in the general defence of the empire without providing these ships is futile, says the league.

DANGER OF FLOODS PASSED

Snow Gone All Over the Country, Weather Bureau Says

Washington, March 21.—Danger of floods from melting snow is over, according to the weather bureau. Snow has disappeared all over the country, except in the more elevated districts. Ice has broken up and gone out of the principal rivers, with a few exceptions, without causing a marked rise in the streams.

Why Coal is Dear

Of course, the cost of anthracite in the past ten years has been only moderately increased by the increases of wages, generally the result of strikes. On the first occasion when wages were advanced, the increased charge for coal was nearly double for increase of wages. After the great strike of a dozen years ago the increase of prices was greater than the increase of wages. The increased cost of coal during the past ten years is due to the suppression of competition and the final conquest of the independent producers just before the great strike, and to the fact that the freight rate on anthracite is higher than that on general merchandise.

Hamel's Organ

Handel's organ in St. Lawrence's church, Whitechurch, Edgeware, which has been restored, will shortly be reopened, says the rector, the Rev. H. F. Robinson, in an appeal for £144 to complete the restoration fund. The keys on which Handel played, 1718-12, have been restored. The organ has a case carved by Grinling Gibbons.

SHIPPING "POOL" RUMORS

One Report Says Representatives Are Deadlocked

Berlin, March 21.—There are several versions of the proceedings of the representatives of the shipping companies who are endeavoring to reach a settlement with reference to the trans-Atlantic shipping pool. One version has it that substantial progress was made yesterday on all points, including the Canadian traffic, the Mediterranean re-adjustment and first-class regulations. Another version would seem to indicate that the controversy on quotas is no nearer a settlement, that the representatives have practically reached a deadlock, and that a sudden adjournment is probable.

As claims for increased quotas are being stoutly adhered to, the British representatives abandoned hope of reaching an agreement and declared they would take no further interest in the proceedings, but the continental representatives succeeded in persuading them to participate. Several of the leaders then constituted themselves into a committee for the purpose of finding, if possible, a compromise whereby they might save the general pool.

One proposal is that the emperor be requested to arbitrate, but it is not expected this will receive much support. The emperor, however, is taking keen interest in the conference and is taking daily reports.

WOMEN IN GERMAN COLLEGES

Great Rush to Attend Schools Has Taken Place

Berlin, March 21.—The number of women students at German universities has been nearly quadrupled during the last six years, according to figures just announced. In the winter of 1908, when German universities were first fully opened to women, there were 1,108 women students enrolled; to-day there are 3,886 taking regular courses, and as many more attending lectures.

More than six per cent. of the total students at German universities are women. More than half are studying philosophy, languages and history; somewhat more than one-fourth are studying medicine and more than one-fifth natural sciences.
