TO THEIR REGIMENTS PREMIER ASQUITH ANNOUNCES

Unionists Believe Government Participates in a Fiasco - Ulster Wins Its Fight They Claim -Criticism of Government.

London, March 24 .- The defection of the army officers who refused to serve in Ulster is now a closed incident, but its consequences are likely to prove far-reaching.

Premier Asquith and Colonel Seely, secretary of state for war, make explanations before an excited and turbulent house yesterday that the whole affair was the result of a misunderstanding.

This misunderstanding, it was inferred, although they did not directly say so, was due to misconstruction of the government's plans by the commanding general, Sir Arthur Paget, whereby he informed the officers in Ireland that they were to move on Ulster for a repressive

General Paget and three senior fficers from the Carragh camp --General Gough, Colonel McEwan and Colonel Parker-were summonto to London for a conference. cording to official statements, the misunderstanding has been cleared

The terms on which the officers remain at their posts were not disclosed, but the general belief is that they were assured that they would not be compelled to fight against the Ulster men. This is considered a distinct

surrender by the government. Lord Morley of Blackburn explained the House of Lords significantly that he did not think, in the inter ests of the efficiency of the army, that all that transpired in the army council should be made public, and that the king approved the orders

to the officers to return. The unionists firmly believe that the government has participated in asco. They think that the two most enterprising spirits of the David Lloyd-George and Spencer Churchill, were the chief mov ers in the plans and that the government proposed a wholesale movement of troops into Ulster to overcome the covenanters by the display of superior force and the arrest of their leaders, by the opposition of the ofligers.

Some of the unionist members sert that Andrew Bonar Law recently received a letter quoting one of highest officers in Ireland as saying : By Saturday there will be hundreds dead in Ulster."
