REV. H. I. AND MRS. ALLEN CELEBRATE IN OTTAWA
Now on Superannuation — Event is Observed at Home on Park Avenue To-day.
Rev. and Mrs. H. I. Allen, who have been residents of Ottawa for the last fifteen years, residing at 30 Park Avenue, celebrated their golden wedding anniversary to-day. Mr. and Mrs. Allen were at home to their many friends all day. Mr. Allen is a retired Methodist church minister, having been superannuated several years ago owing to ill-health.
Rev. Mr. Allen was born in August 1837, at Wilton, Lennox county. He received his early education at Odessa, Newburgh High School and Albert college, Belleville. For a number of years Mr. Allen taught school and then entered the ministry of the Methodist church in 1874. After 25 years of service he was superannuated and came to Ottawa from NAGANOE. He was the seventh son of the late Timothy C. Allen, who was born in Hudson, N. Y. Mr. Allen's father saw the first steamship launched in America in the Hudson river in 1809.
Mrs. Allen is the daughter of the late Hiram Smith of Woodstock, Ont., light-house inspector for many years. Mr. and Mrs. Allen were married on March 24th, 1864. Their family consists of Graham H. Allen, of Toronto, city manager of the North American Life Insurance company; Dr. J. Ross Allen, of Olean, N. Y.; and Ernest H. Allen, of the interior department, who resides with his parents in Ottawa.

CAMPAIGN OF THE Y.M.C.A.
To Raise \$4,000 During the Present Week.
The annual financial campaign in connection with the Y. M. C. A. is now in full swing and will be continued for the rest of the week. On Monday evening about fifty men, interested in Y. M. C. A. work, gathered at the building for the purpose of framing up the plans for the canvass. There are twenty-five young men assisting the members of the board of directors and some of their friends. The members of the young men's cabinet are taking an active part.
It will cost \$4,000 to run the association during the coming year, of which sum about \$1,800 will be secured through membership fees while the remaining \$4,600 will have to be collected during the week. The Y. M. C. A. is doing a good work among the young men.
The first reports of the campaign will be received on Thursday evening when all the collectors will be present at a supper to be served in the association building.
D. G. Laidlaw, president of the board of directors, is the general chairman; H. E. Fense, president of the young men's cabinet, is assistant general chairman.
