People Healthier When Lays Sanitary Precautions
Kingston, March 25.—(To the Editor): So the Board of Trade advises the appointment of another inspector. How far ahead is this movement to go? Are we not already overburdened with officials? There has been little increase in our population yet our expenditures on the police department has increased; the fire department is costing us much more money than it did twenty years ago. From whatever angle one looks it is increased expenditure.
Sanitary precautions are well enough in their place, but I quite well remember when we were practically without any. It is within my recollection when all refuse was dumped on the ice in the winter, when the residents of Ontario and adjacent streets secured their drinking water from the lake, using a pail. I also recall when the moss-covered buckets at McCammon's well on Johnson street supplied the neighborhood for blocks, and the same well was but a few feet from a slaughter house. None of these people were sickly, all were healthy. Many able-bodied men were raised in that district. There then was the Stewartville section. No sanitary fads there, and better men physically than the result than now. All Williamsville, or Rideau ward, was honeycombed with wells and slaughter houses, and a healthy class of men and women grew there.
In those days one very rarely heard of cancer, appendicitis or the many ills that are the fashion now. Was it because people lived the simple life and knew nothing of the canned commodities that are now on the market; or what? Yet it is true they were healthier in the old days.
