

COMMITTEE WILL ASK COUNCIL! THERE FOR SUM OF \$2,475

Summer - Suggestion to Place Ring in City Park in Better Con-

The Civic Parks Committee, of held its first meeting of the year on Tuesday afternoon, in the mayor's office, and prepared estimates for the summer's work.

The committee decided to ask the council for the sum of \$2,475. Last year the committee expended the sum of \$2,307.21 outside of the amount. paid out in ralaries.

On motion of Ald. Newman, the chairman and the superintendent of parks, W. H. Phillips, were instructed to make the necessary purchases of trees, plants and bulbs; a motion of Ald. White also being passed granting the chairman to make an expenditure up to \$60.

The chairman brought a new and most important matter before the committee in regard to the outer ring at the City park. He said that in view of the fact that there were biles which cut up this roadway, that the city should do something towards putting it in better shape. 
