STANLEY CUP GOES TO NATIONAL COMMISSION

Regina Wants John Ross Robertson Cup — Hockey Rules Being Revised by Harvard and Princeton Representatives.

There will be no more wrangling in connection with the Stanley cup. The trustees, Messrs. Foran and Ross, are evidently glad to have at least some of the responsibility for the famous trophy lifted off their shoulders and have written President Emmet Quinn, of the N.H.A., stating that as the cup has been accepted as the emblem of the professional championship of Canada, they will in future leave everything in the hands of the National Commission. All they request is that they be kept in touch with the condition of affairs in order that there may be no failure on the part of the winning club to provide the usual bond for the safekeeping of the silverware. Only in cases of dispute between the Maritime, National and Pacific Coast Hockey Association will the board of trustees be called upon to readjust matters.

Game Too Rough

With the object of eliminating the "rough tactics" that have developed under present day hockey rules, representatives of Harvard and Princeton are now engaged on a revision of the rules of the Canadian game. When the draft is completed it will be submitted to Yale, the St. Nicholas club of New York, the Boston Athletic Association and possibly others for discussion.

Hockey Gossip

The Vancouver players made more of their exhibition games than did the Victorias out of the world's series. They got \$1,250 for each of their three exhibition games in the east and split up the purse at New York.

There may be changes in both pro leagues next year, according to Ottawa advice. Hamilton is anxious to get into the N.H.A., and Westminster may be dropped from the P.C.H.L. in favor of Portland or Seattle. The other two clubs had to carry Westminster along this winter.

Regina Cricketers Want Cup

Regina cricketers are determined to bring the Ross Robertson cup, emblematic of the amateur cricket championship of Canada, to Regina during the present year. Fired by the example of the Victorias in bringing the Allan cup to Regina, there is a very strong movement on foot among the cricketers of Regina to follow in the footsteps of the hockey boys and consolidate the four teams in the city into one big club, so that it will be possible to send a representative team to Winnipeg next fall in a strong effort to lift the Ross Robertson cup and place it alongside the Allan cup.

THE LATE MRS. GRASS

Aged Lady Died in General Hospital Wednesday

On Wednesday afternoon Mrs. Mary Grass, widow of the late Charles Grass, passed away in the general hospital. Death was due to a broken hip, which, owing to her advanced age, would not heal. Mrs. Grass was the daughter of the late James Stuart, of Glasgow, Scotland, and was born about 1831. She came to this country in 1852. One brother, survivors, James M. Stuart, a prominent artist of Glasgow, who has painted for the royal family. Deceased was a member of Chalmers church. The funeral took place on Thursday morning, from the residence of Thomas Hewitt, Lower Union street. Rev. Dr. Macgillivray officiated.

JUDGMENT RESERVED

In Case of Whig Publishing Co. vs. J. J. Harpell

Judgment was reserved by Justice Sutherland in the case of the British Whig Publishing Co., Limited, plaintiff, and J. J. Harpell, defendant. The plaintiff's claim was for \$1,440.12 and interest thereon from March 23rd, 1911. The high court, which resumed at 7.30 o'clock Wednesday evening, did not adjourn until 10.30 o'clock. J. J. Harpell, the defendant, acted in the capacity of manager of Queen's University Quarterly for about four years' time. He gave four promissory notes, amounting to \$1,000, which have not been paid. The claim of the defendant was that he had only acted under a committee and for that reason was not personally responsible for the debt which had been incurred.

G. V. Chown, registrar of the university, swore that Mr. Harpell had assumed the full responsibility of publishing the Quarterly. The minute book which he had in court showed the defendant had agreed to assume this responsibility, and was to pay all accounts. In case of a profit, that money would go to him.

OLD MAN COMES TO PRISON.

Has Already Served Twenty-five Years Behind Bars

On Wednesday afternoon Sheriff Alexander Morris and Constable T. Dixon, of Pembroke, brought an old man named White to the city to spend three years in Portsmouth penitentiary for stealing an overcoat at Arrapicor. The guilty party stole one coat valued at one hundred dollars and sold it for five dollars. Not being content he went back the next day and stole another but before he made his escape he was caught. For the first offence he received thirty days and for the second offence three years, both terms to run concurrently. This old man has a record of twenty-five years' imprisonment against him, which he has served on different occasions.
