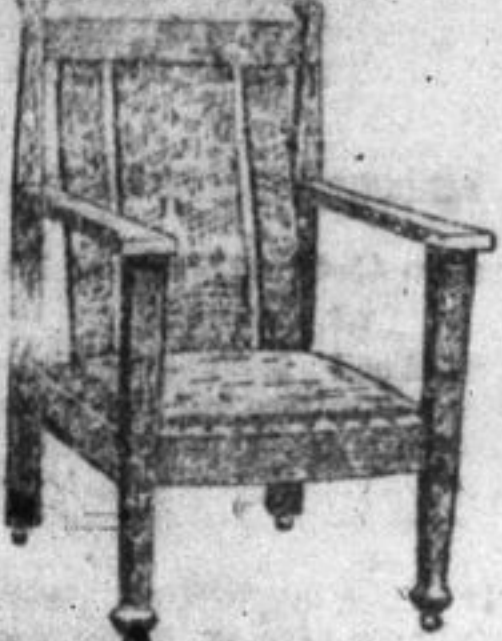

HOTELS IN KINGSTON

MUST BE EQUIPPED IN CASE OF FIRE. Every Bedroom Must be Provided With Piece of Good Reliable Rope and Permanently Secured and Ready for Use — Sanitary Inspection Will be a Strict One.

The Kingston hotels will be subject to a special inspection this year, by the inspector, C. W. Wright, as regards fire escapes, and also on sanitary lines. Each hotel will be called upon to have placed in every bedroom, in the hotel, a good reliable piece of rope, to be permanently secured for use in case of fire. The inspection along sanitary lines will also be a strict one.

MADE STARTLING DISCOVERY

Regarding Prices of Goods in Paris and New York.

In a letter addressed to the president of the People's National Bank of Pittsburgh, Col. Samuel Haroon March states that while in Europe last summer he made the somewhat startling discovery that articles frequently purchased in European shops can be bought to better advantage as regards quality, attractive models and price, in New York than in Paris. He learned upon inquiry of Frenchmen of high position the reason for high prices abroad. "They require," he says, "without hesitation that the extra war taxes prevailing everywhere. For example, every sou in the population of France, young and old, and both sexes included, is required to pay on the average \$7 a year for the maintenance of the army and navy, and this does not include pensions."

Col. Haroon also drew up some statistics showing the cost of war preparation for each of the ten principal nations (without including pensions or the destruction caused by past wars) and the ratio which the cost of army and navy bears to the total expenditures of each nation. The figures are for the year 1911; since the Russian war the European nations have increased financial burdens.

The cost of the army and navy, in Austria-Hungary was 9.8 per cent, of the nation's total expenditure; in Spain, 22.9 per cent.; in Russia, 23.5 per cent.; in Italy, 24.1 per cent.; in France, 30.9 per cent.; in Turkey, 31.4 per cent.; in Japan, 32.5 per cent.; in Great Britain, 34.3 per cent.; in the United States, 43.3 per cent.; in Germany, 43.3 per cent.

The cost per unit of population varies from \$1.70 in Austria-Hungary to \$7.60 in Great Britain.

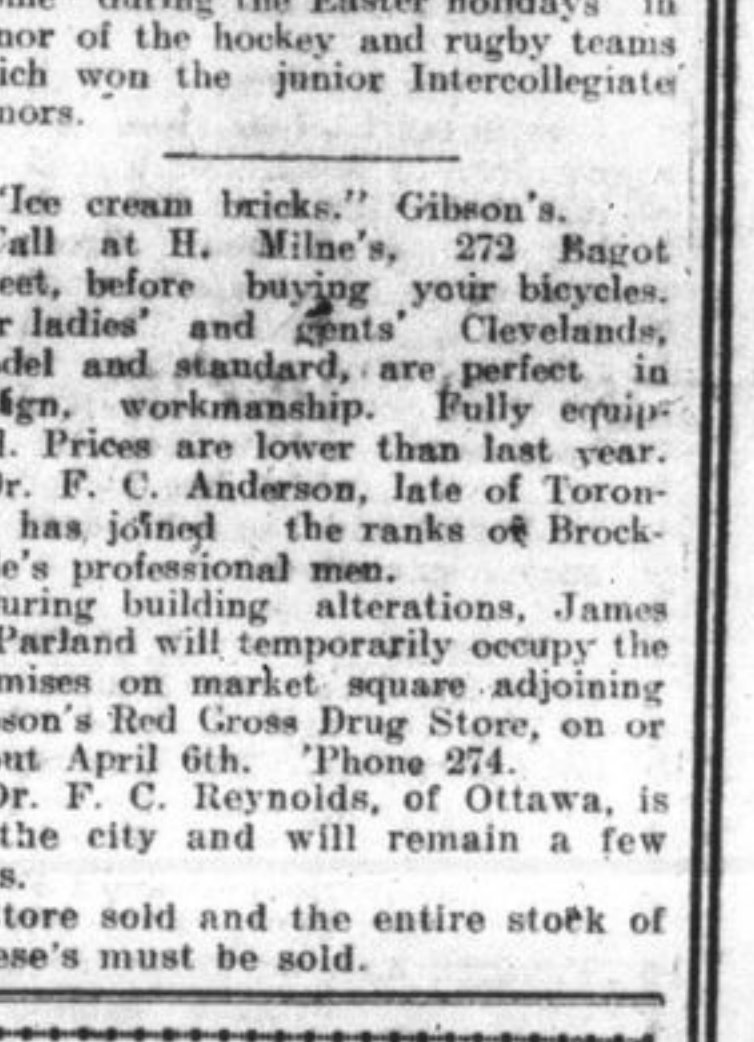
The People's National Bank concludes the statement thus: "Altogether apart from the political side of the question, it must be obvious to all thinking persons that such huge burdens impair the economic efficiency of nations; and, if effect is carefully traced back to causes, will be found largely responsible for the social unrest in Europe."
